


It has been observed in the act by Dr. George Wald, who described the process to a seminar of scientists at the Marine Biological Laboratory. He made his investigations at Heidelberg and the University of Chicago.

Dr. Wald reported that the vitamir is manufactured from a yellowish pigment in the visual purple, a hemical secreted in the retina. The newly discovered pigment has been named retinene. It is similar to the carotene which gives corn and carrots their yellow color and provides the body with a more familiar source

of vitamin A.

This was the first time any vita
min's chemical activity had been cbserved in the human body.

Vitamin A's importance to human vision, like the visual purple, has long been known. "Night blindness," a fairly common trouble, followes deficiency of the vitamin and some times precedes total blindness.

Auto Killings Alm't Like Results of War

Sixty Killed and Nearly 1,100 Persons Injured in Month of July.

Increases in accidents, fatalities non-fatal injuries, and property damage were shown in a comparison of figures for the first seven months of 1934 with those for the corres ponding period of 1933. Accident numbered 4,674 or 4.7 per cent, mor than last year; fatalities and in-juries were 10.9 per cent. and 5.2 per cent. greater, while the estimated property damage loss from reported accidents was \$443,064 or 7.2 per

cent. more than in 1933. As compared with the increase 4.7 per cent. in the number of ac-cidents reported, urban (city, town and village) mishaps showed a gain of 5.1 per cent., while those on rural roads increased by 3.9 per cent.

Of tragic significance was the injury of 1,026 persons in Ontario motor accidents during the month of This total was greater than July. for any previous month in the history of the motor vehicle in this province, and gives very tangible proof of the seriousness of the present situation.

The picture of such a waste can not be easily dismissed from our minds by attributing it to the increase in the number of motor ve hicles, or to drunken drivers. It was rather the average motorist, the average pedestrian, who carelessly commits what he considers minor violations, who was responsible for the majority of these injuries.
