Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle have been the heaviest during the present fall season, there being almost 6000 cattle on sale Monday with a further 1000 fresh cattle for Tuesday's market.

All classes of well finished cattle met with a fair demand at steady prices, best heavy steers selling at from 4% to 5%.

Choice butcher steers sold at from 3% to 4%, medium according to quality. There was over 1500 cattle arrived from the Western provinces, comprising mostly stockers and feeders. A large percentage of these were of medium grade and were slow of sale at from 2 to 2 1/2%, with those of selected quality ranging from 2% to 3%.

There was a heavy carry-over Monday, but a good export buyers' market made since that time.

The cow trade has improved, especially on those of the canner and cutter type, selling from 1 1/2 to 1 3/4, and fair to good fat cows from 2 to 2 1/2. Milch cows are selling from \$30 to \$45 and those of best quality.

Lamb met with a strong demand, and prices on choice quality ewes ranged from 6 to 6 1/2, with some show lambs at 6 1/2. Bucks and culs sold at from 4% to 5%.

All classes of sheep held steady, best kind selling from 2 1/2 to 3 cents.

Choice veal calves bringing from 6 to 7 cents, fair to good from 5 to 6 cents, others lower according to quality, grass calves 2 1/2 to 3%.

With a strong demand for hogs, the market has advanced considerably, showing a gain of 50 cents, comparing a week ago. Hogs sold on the basis of \$7.35 to \$7.40 l.o.b., truck hogs from \$7.65 to \$7.75 at the close.
