Hockey

Mr. Frank Kemp, better known to the sporting world as "Fish," a sporting enthusiast and for years one of Listowel's leading athletes, is endeavouring to re-organize the old Northern Hockey League or if that is not possible, to start a new hockey league for the towns in this part of Ontario.

Realizing the opportunity there is for a league of this kind to operate and after being approached by several enthusiasts from various towns in this district, Mr. Kemp is making an effort to create an interest and is willing to do all within his power to encourage Canada's national winter pastime. It is his sincere desire to see a league booming with interest like the old Northern League was when at its height.

He believes that many towns have lost interest because of the unfair competition and the treatment given them by the O.H.A. Players also, are not so enthusiastic as they should be as they realize the futility in going out and playing their heads off, so to speak, without any possible chance of getting anywhere. However, if conditions were altered and a new league started that would give everyone an even chance, there would no doubt be a revival of the game and once more every town in this part of Ontario would be booming with hockey enthusiasm.

The following circular has been sent out to the secretaries of the teams in a number of towns and those who received them would do well to answer the letter and express their views.

Listowel, Oct. 17, 1934.
Secretary Hockey Club:

Dear Sir:
Several Hockey Clubs have asked me to see what I can do towards getting the Northern League going, or failing to do this, to start a new League.

The teams from this end of the province have very little chance of winning anything in the O. H. A., and it is hardly fair to ask young hockey players to go out and give their best, knowing that in the end they have to finish in the discard.

There is absolutely no reason why the Northern League cannot function and eventually be a wonderful League. I am not blaming anyone for the condition in which we find it at the present time as I think we are all to blame.

Will you kindly be good enough not to throw this letter aside even if you are interested or not interested, but would you kindly write me by return mail and answer the following questions:

1. Are you interested in the revival of The Northern Hockey League?

2. Are you interested in forming a new League?

When answering these questions kindly bear in mind that we can run an Intermediate 'A', 'B', and 'C' League, and group the teams according to their respective strengths, thus giving every team a fighting chance. This applies to Junior Hockey also, and we, as sports, must certainly do something towards bringing young players along in our towns, and in answering these questions, if you are not interested in Senior Hockey, kindly keep in mind the Junior end.

Please answer this letter immediately as there is a lot of work in connection with this, and if we have enough clubs willing to go ahead we will have to have a meeting in the near future.
