Live Stock Market

(By Dunn & Levack, Ltd., Toronto)
Supplies of cattle have continued liberal again this week, and the general quality of the cattle on offer has not been good. On Monday the market was very slow in getting under way, and very little business was done until noon-hour. Export buyers were limited in their operations, buying a few of the best heavy steers at from 4½ to 5 cents. The bulk of the good heavy steers sold at from 3½ to 4¼, rough kind downward to 3 cents. There was a scarcity of choice butcher cattle, which sold at from 3½ to 4¼, fair to good at from 2½ to 3½, common downward to 1½. Choice baby heaves held active and steady at from 6 to 7 cents, medium babies ranged in price from 4 to 5½ cents. While the cow trade held steady, prices were not satisfactory, the bulk of the choice fat cows bringing from 2 to 2¼. Canners and cutters in strong demand at from 1 to 1½. Best bulls sold at from 2½ to 2¾. Bolognas mostly 2 cents.

Stockers and feeders of selected quality have again met with an active trade, while common cattle were slow to move at unsatisfactory prices, many of these having to be sold to the packers for boning purposes at from 1½ to 1¾. Best light stockers made from 2½ to 2¾, while top feeders sold at from 3 to 3½, and more would have sold had they been available.

The usual heavy fall runs of lambs appear to be about at an end, and the market has held firm, best ewes selling at from 6¼ to 6.40, with a few lots of carlot lambs at 6½. Buyers were willing to pay the price for choice fat lambs from 85 to 90 pounds, while those of medium quality were bought on their merits. Culls, heavies and bucks were discounted \$1.00 per cwt. All classes of sheep held steady.

The calf trade has been active and steady for choice veal, while common and medium sold at from 15 to 25 cents lower. Best calves sold at from 6 to 7 cents, with a few fancy calves at 7.50. Heavy calves made from 2½ to 3 cents. Grass calves from 2½ to 2¾.

The hog market has been disappointing following the recent advances made in October. Supplies have been heavy at all centres and sharp declines have been shown in prices. Sales during the early part of this week were made mostly on the basis of 6.90 to 7.00 f.o.b. and 7.35 off-trucks. It is not likely that prices will be any better just now, and a great deal will depend upon supplies during the month of November.
