Live Stock Market

(By Dunn & Levack, Ltd., Toronto)

Supplies of cattle eased off considerably for this week's market, and the trade has been somewhat better on practically all classes of cattle. The best demand was shown for choice baby heaves and handy-weight butcher cattle, while choice heavy steers were active and steady at from 4 1/2 to 5 cents, with a few tops at 5 1/2. The bulk of the best butchers sold at from 3 1/2 to 4 cents, fair to good, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2, common 1 1/2 to 2 1/2. Good to choice babies ranged from 5 1/2 to 7 cents. All classes of cows held steady, choice from 2 to 2 1/2, canners and cutters 1 to 1 1/2. Choice heavy bulls were in good demand at from 2 1/2 to 3 cents. Bolognas 2 cents.

The stocker and feeder trade continued to command the interest of a large number of farmer buyers, who apparently realize that there is an opportunity to feed some cattle to advantage for this winter's market, and which is generally considered to be certain of profitable investment. Best stockers sold at from 2 1/2 to 2 3/4, and feeders from 3 to 3 1/2. Common and medium kind at lower prices according to quality.

With continued moderate runs of lambs, the market has advanced sharply recently. Monday's top sales were made at 6 1/2, and to-day, Tuesday, the market advanced to 7 cents for fancy carload shipments, with truck deliveries ranging from 6.60 to 6.75. The sheep trade has held steady. Choice veal calves were in strong demand at from 6 1/2 to 7 cents, fair to good from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2. Heavy calves slow at from 3 to 3 1/2, grass calves from 2 1/2 to 3 cents.

Following a general impression that hogs would be lower this week, a quick change took place, when supplies eased off and instead of a loss being registered, a gain of 15 cents was made on Monday, and another 10 cents to-day, the market closing at 6.90 to 7.00 f.o.b., and from 7.25 to 7.35 off-trucks, plus the usual premium of \$1.00 each on select hogs.
