### Report of Temperance Study Course

In the recent Sunday School Temperance Study Course conducted here sixty-five girls and boys took part. In Cooke's Presbyterian twenty-five, Annesley United, twenty-five, Gospel Workers, ten and Harkaway United, five. In Cooke's fourteen received honours which is 65% and over. Five received pass or 50 to 74% and six failed. Examiners were Rev. T. O. Miller and Miss Irene McAllister.

In Annesley twenty-one received honours and four pass. Examiners were Mrs. M. A. Henry, Mrs. K. G. Goheen and Miss M. McLoughry. In the Gospel Workers school seven received honours, two a pass and one failed. Examiners were Mrs. A. Mills and Mr. Young. In Harkaway School four received honours and one failed. Examiners were Mrs. W. T. Wiley and Mrs. S. L. Hare.

The lessons were graded according to age. Those 9 years and under answering the first question of each lesson in the junior grade, while those 10 and 11 years answered both questions. In the Senior-Intermediate grade intermediates of 12, 13 and 14 years answered only question 2 while seniors of 15, 16 and 17 answered both questions in each lesson.

The best three papers in each grade of each school were submitted to the local W.C.T.U. whose examiners, Miss E. C. Hawken, Mrs. S. L. Hare and Mrs. F. J. Ritchie looked them over and sent the best twelve papers—three from each grade, to the County examiner, who from all papers submitted by the various Sunday Schools of the County will choose the best sixteen papers—four from each grade and forward them to the Provincial judges or examining committee.

The local branch of the W.C.T.U. donated \$15.00 toward prizes. This was divided between the four schools according to the number from each school taking part. Certificates have been received for all who have taken 50% or over and will have already been presented. This is the seventh Temperance Study Course put on in the Sunday School. The Dominion organization of W.C.T.U. will give an award to all who have taken five of the seven courses. Names should be left with Mrs. S. L. Hare.

#### Live Stock Market

(By Dunn & Leveck, Ltd., Toronto)  
Supplies of cattle were liberal for the early markets of this week, and while the trade was slow at times, prices have held up well, excepting on steers of medium quality and fat cows.

Exporters and packers were active buyers of choice heavy steers at from 3 1/2 to 6 cents, fair to good from 5 to 5 1/2, medium 4 to 5. Choice butcher steers sold readily at from 4 1/2 to 4 3/4, fair to good from 4 to 4 1/2, others lower accordingly. Choice baby heaves were in strong demand at from 6 to 7 cents, medium from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2. The cow trade opened slow with buyers bidding quarter lower, which finally had to be accepted on the choice fat cows, selling mostly at 2 1/4 to 2.65, others steady. The bull trade has been slow, choice from 2 1/2 to 3 cents.

Lamb prices advanced another quarter on Monday, choice lambs making 8 cents. Quite a number arrived from Alberta feedlots, which were of very nice quality. Good butcher sheep sold at from 3 to 3 1/2. The calf market has held active and strong, best veal calves making from 7 to 8 cents, fair to good from 6 to 7 and medium from 5 to 6. The hog market has recovered some of the decline shown in last week's trading. On Monday, prices advanced 10 cents and to-day, Tuesday, another 20 cents, selling at 7.50 to 8.00, 7.55 to 7.95 off-trucks, and 8.25 off-cars. The general feeling is that the market will hold steady to strong.

He was a great reader and was gifted with a wonderful memory and it was therefore a pleasure to converse with him as he was well posted on all subjects. The home was always noted for its hospitality. He was school secretary-treasurer for a number of years and was a Liberal in politics. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Elizabeth Craig, and one daughter, Ruby (Mrs. Sowerby) of Holland. The funeral was held on New Year's day to Shiloh cemetery. The service at the house and grave was well taken by Rev. Dr. Boudreau, Presbyterian minister at Chatsworth, who brought a comforting message to the mourners and friends. The friends coming from a distance were Mr. and Mrs. John McCullough and Mr. and Mrs. John Radford of Toronto; Mr. and Mrs. John Binkly of Kitchener; Mrs. Lee and Mr. and Mrs. Murphy of Owen Sound.
