

## MARKDALE'S REEVE IS WARDEN OF GREY

**MR. J. C. MERCER WAS CHOSEN BY HIS FELLOW MEMBERS ON TUESDAY EVENING TO PRESIDE OVER COUNTY COUNCIL DURING 1935**

At the first meeting of Grey County Council, held on Tuesday evening Mr. J. C. Mercer, Reeve of Markdale, was chosen as Warden for 1935, getting the position without opposition.

Mr. Mercer has been a member of the County Council for four years, having been first elected Reeve of the village at the beginning of 1931. Previous to that he had served four years as a Councillor, one year on the High School Board and ten years as Village Auditor. During his term in the County Council he has held the chairmanship of several important committees and is well qualified for the important office to which he has been promoted. Markdale's pavement was constructed while he was Reeve of the village and his progressiveness has been reflected in many ways.

John Clarence Mercer is the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Mercer and he was born here on June 7th, 1896. In 1916 he married Mary Ella Richardson, daughter of Mr. Walter N. Richardson and the late Mrs. Richardson. They have two sons, Jack and Bill. He is an Anglican in religion and a member of the Past Grand of Saugeen Lodge No. 327, I.O.O.F., and of Hiram Lodge No. 490, A.F. & A.M., and was the Worshipful Master in 1925. He served as Grand Steward in the Masonic Grand Lodge. Since the death of his father in 1929, in partnership with his brother, Mr. H. H. Mercer, J. C. has continued the long established Mercer business here.

### Mrs. Andrew McCauley

Mrs. Annie McCauley, one of Flesherton's most widely loved citizens, passed away late Friday morning at the home of her son, Reeve Howard McCauley after a short illness. The late Mrs. McCauley was in her usual health the first of the week and was up and about, visiting friends. Wednesday she suffered a stroke, which rendered her unconscious. She was taken to the home of her son, but in spite of every care she failed to rally and passed away, Friday without regaining consciousness. Deceased who was 74 years of age, had resided in Flesherton since 1907. News of her death was received with deep regret by her many friends in this village and throughout the surrounding district.

The late Mrs. McCauley was born at Acton, Ont., she being the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Wright. She moved to Proton with her parents when she was still a girl and about fifty years ago was united in marriage to Andrew McCauley. They resided in Proton at first, later moving to Euphrasia and then to Ceylon, where they lived until coming to Flesherton in 1907. Mr. McCauley predeceased his wife in October of 1914.

Deceased leaves to mourn her passing three sons, Howard, Reeve of Flesherton, John of Owen Sound and Roy of Toronto, and two daughters, Margaret, Mrs. William Meldrum, of Gimli, Man., and Jessie, Mrs. Vernon Campbell, of Grand View, Man. One son, Thomas, predeceased her in 1904. The late Mrs. McCauley, who was the youngest of a family of seven, was the last surviving member.

Deceased was very well known and highly esteemed and she will be mourned by a host of friends. She was possessed of a cheerful disposition which earned her the love of many acquaintances. The late Mrs. McCauley was noted as a great reader and book-lover.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon. A service was held at the home of her son, Reeve Howard McCauley, at 2 p.m. Interment was made in Flesherton Cemetery.

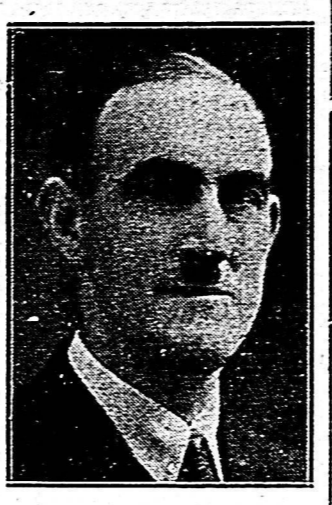
The auditors' report was most favorably received, showing that the society had again been able to maintain its proud record of "always paying in full" and leaving a balance on hand of \$403.17.

### Bringing Deer to Grey and Bruce

With an aim to having deer more plentiful in Grey and Bruce, the Ontario Department of Game and Fisheries is having a number of deer from Rondeau Park, in Kent County, brought to these counties. The deer will be trucked into Grey and Bruce by the same trucks which conveyed them to Rondeau from Western Canada several years ago.

According to D. J. Taylor, Deputy-Minister of the Department, the deer are becoming too inbred and scrawny in Rondeau, as well as being too numerous. In addition there is not sufficient food there for the number of deer.

The animals should improve and increase in more natural surroundings, Mr. Taylor states. While the plan is but an experiment, it is hoped that it will be successful in increasing the number of deer in this district, so that there may be an open season in a year or two.

### Live Stock Market

(By Dunn & Levack, Ltd., Toronto)

The cattle market has shown some improvement this week, and prices on cattle of choice quality are slightly higher, also the cow trade shows some improvement over last week.

Choice heavy steers sold at from 5 1/2 to 6 cents, fair to good from 5 to 5 1/2, others lower according to quality. In the butcher section, there was a good demand for choice steers at from 4 1/2 to 5 cents, while heifers were slow and quarter lower, choice selling from 4 1/2 to 4 3/4. Fair to good butchers from 3 1/2 to 4 1/4. Choice baby heaves held steady at from 6 to 7, but those of medium quality were slow of sale and slightly lower in price, ranging from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2. The cow trade was active and stronger, choice from 2 1/2 to 3 1/4, fair to good from 2 1/4 to 2.65, others lower accordingly. Milch cows and springers held steady, best kind from \$35 to \$45, others slow of sale. The bull trade was slow and barely steady, top sales being made at 3 cents.

Supplies of lambs have been heavier, and with the arrival of large shipments of lamb from New Zealand, it has had a serious effect on the market, prices dropping from 50 to 75 cents on Monday, and holding steady to-day. Top lambs sold at from 7 to 7 1/2, with quite a few good lambs down to 6 1/2. The sheep trade held about steady. Calves continued to sell well, especially for choice veal, while those of common and medium quality were about half easier. Choice calves from 7 to 7 1/2, good from 6 1/2 to 7, common from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2.

The hogs market has held steady with the close of last week, sales ranging from 7.75 to 7.85 f.o.b. and from 8 to 8.15 off-trucks. A great deal will depend upon supplies as to what the future prices will be for the balance of the week, and for next week.
