### Keeling Case Dismissed

Charges of criminal negligence, laid against Clinton Keeling of Owen Sound, were dismissed by his Honour Judge Morley in County Criminal Court in Owen Sound on Wednesday of last week.

The charge was laid against Keeling following the inquest into the death of Telford Stokes of Orangeville. Stokes was killed while riding in Keeling's car last autumn. The car collided with a truck, driven by Robert Bartley of Owen Sound, on Highway No. 10, south of Markdale and Stokes was instantly killed.

At the inquest which followed the coroner's jury decided there was some negligence on the part of Keeling and accordingly County Crown Attorney J. P. Birnie, K.C., laid the criminal negligence charge.

In court on Wednesday, following the submission of evidence by Crown, Mr. F. G. Keelney, counsel for the accused, moved for dismissal, without offering any defence evidence, and Judge Morley decided to dismiss the charge without further evidence.

### William W. Trimble

William Wesley Trimble, Flesherton's veteran postmaster, passed away at his home there on Monday morning in his 81st year. Deceased had been ill for the past three months. News of his passing will be received with great regret in this vicinity.

The late Mr. Trimble, who celebrated his 80th birthday on Dec. 6th, was born in Artemesia Township, one mile north of Flesherton and had resided in the district all his life. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Trimble. For the past thirty years he had served the residents of Flesherton and the surrounding district as postmaster. Deceased was twice married. His first wife, to whom he was married 57 years ago, was Adela Baskerville, daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. Baskerville. She predeceased him seven years ago and four years ago he was united in marriage to his sister-in-law, Mrs. Robert Trimble, who now survives to mourn his passing. He also leaves three daughters, Zilla, Mrs. C. N. Richardson of Flesherton, Ethel, Mrs. W. I. Hodgson of Islington, Ont., and Ruby, Mrs. (Dr.) W. Trelford of Toronto, and one son, Robert, manager of the Bank of Montreal at Lambton Mills, Ont. Another son, Percy, passed away a number of years ago. The late Mr. Trimble had two brothers, James and Robert, and a sister, Meda, all of whom predeceased him.

Deceased was a great lover of sport and was especially interested in horses and horse racing. In politics he was a staunch Liberal. He was a Methodist in religion and a member of St. John's United Church. The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon to Flesherton Cemetery.

### Charles Mosier

Charles Mosier, whose smiling face has been seen at practically every sporting event in this vicinity for many years past, died at his home a mile and a half east of this village on Sunday, Jan. 27. 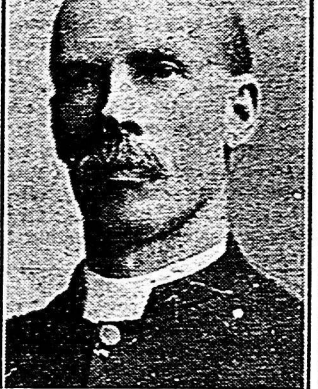

### Workers Insurance Bill Got First its Reading at Ottawa on Tuesday

Intimate friends here of Rev. John Hunter, beloved pastor some years ago, of Cooke's Presbyterian Church here, and the associated charge of Cooke's Church at Berkeley, received on Wednesday of last week intimation of his death, which occurred at his home at 98 Clarence Drive, Glasgow, Scotland, on January 9th. He had been in failing health for some months.

Surviving are his three daughters—Mrs. J. Colin Robinson (Jane), and Misses Jessie and Mary, all of Glasgow. Mrs. Hunter predeceased her husband about twenty years ago. Rev. J. Hunter was called to this charge in the autumn of 1895 and until June of 1904, when he made a holiday visit to Scotland, the land of his birth, he laboured diligently and faithfully in fair weather and foul. Sometimes on stormy Sundays in winter, when the road was unfit for driving he walked the five miles to Berkeley for the afternoon service, returning for the evening service here. During his pastorate both congregations were built up not only numerically but spiritually also.

In Mrs. Hunter he had an able and willing helpmate. She with her gentle winning manner and keen interest in everything pertaining to the work of the church, won the love of all both old and young. The girls too were popular with their schoolmates.

Previous to his coming to Markdale, Mr. Hunter held a pastorate at Oro for some years. During his visit in Scotland, he was called to a pastorate at Leuchars and duty to join him there. That autumn they sailed for Scotland. Subsequently Mr. Hunter held a charge at Uddingston and at Carroushore near Falkirk. It was there that Mrs. Hunter passed on to her reward. Following her death he retired from pastoral work and settled in Glasgow, where he was very frequently called upon to supply.

He was a clear and forceful exponent of the Gospel. On all his charges he was very highly esteemed and received many tokens of appreciation.
