## The Late G. C. Graham

The neighborhood was shocked to hear of the untimely death of Mr. Gordon Cardwell Graham on Monday morning, April 22nd, 1935, after a week's illness with pleuro-pneumonia. The late Mr. Graham, who was born in Kimberley in 1883, was in his 52nd year. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Graham. His father predeceased him three weeks ago.

For a number of years Cardwell worked at the bricklaying after which he and his brother, Bert, purchased the store in Eugenia from Hill & Co. They also had a chopping mill and saw mill in connection with the store business. Four years ago the store was burned and the following year it was rebuilt along with a fine residence and the business successfully carried on by the late Mr. Graham and his wife, who was formerly Miss Lily Campbell of this community.

The late Mr. Graham was a very highly esteemed resident of the village and will be greatly missed. He was a kind neighbor and friend, possessing a pleasing disposition, which won for him many friends. He was a member of the Orange order but not of recent years. During his short illness he was tenderly cared for by his loving wife, nurses and doctor. All that could be done was done and death conquered all and on Easter Monday morn at opening of day a voice was calling that seemed to say:

"Ye who are weary come and rest, Lay down your head upon my breast Come follow me and I will guide Thy footsteps on the Jordan side."

Our loved one heard the sweet command and gently took the Saviour's hand.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon, April 24. The remains were taken to the United Church. Owing to the absence of Rev. A. Bushell, Rev. W. J. Scott, pastor of Flesherton United Church, officiated at the Church and grave. He chose the sixth chapter of Romans as Scripture reading and took as his text the last verse of the chapter: "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord." He spoke on the numerous gifts of God, as the great outdoors where all nature has dependence on God. In droughts and famines we realize how much we depend on God. The outstanding gift of God is eternal life which isn't anything we can buy. Believing the Resurrection story and pondering upon what Easter means, the great Christian thought is "In the midst of death we are in life." The question of immortality is bound up in the Easter story. There are three things God has done for us: Confirmed the hope of immortality. The disciples witnessed the rising of Jesus, which proved that there is a love of God that will not let us go and makes us feel the reality of life beyond the grave. Enriched our thought of immortality—He has made us feel that there is life beyond full of joy, hope, gladness and peace. Enhanced our power of immortality—Our hopes urge us on to achieve something. Believe in all things that God says and accept the burdens life imposes and all will be right with you. ## Death of Mrs. A. E. Haw

Death came with tragic suddenness early Sunday morning when Margaret Knox, wife of Mr. A. E. Haw of Salem and formerly of Ceylon, passed away at her home as the result of a stroke.

Mrs. Haw had been about her home as usual on Saturday and during the day had assisted the boys in the planting of their school garden. She retired about 11 p.m. and was suddenly seized with a severe pain in the head. Medical aid could do nothing and she passed away about two hours later.

Mrs. Haw was the daughter of the late Mr. James Knox and Mrs. Jane Richardson Knox and was born 45 years ago on the 18th con., Proton. After normaling at Ottawa she joined the Edmonton, Alberta, Public School teaching staff where she remained till her marriage to Mr. Haw and they settled on the latter's farm near Salem. Thirteen years ago they left the farm and conducted the general store at Ceylon but returned to the farm last spring.

Mrs. Haw was a devoted mother, possessing a keen sense of humour and executive ability. She took a wide interest in the activities of the Church and community and her untimely death has cast a deep shadow on the hearts of her many friends.

Besides her grief stricken husband, she is survived by four children, Mable 14, student at Dundalk N.S.; Allan 13, Gordon 9, Eric 6 and Billy 4. She also leaves her mother, Mrs. James Knox of Ceylon, three sisters, Mabel, Mrs. W. McCormack of Salem; Vina, Mrs. Howlat of Carvel, Alta.; Marion, Mrs. Gillespie of Hopeville, and three brothers, Robt. Knox in the U. S.; William of Bowmanville, and Alex. in Toronto.

The funeral took place on Tuesday at 2 p.m. to Salem Cemetery, Rev. Johnstone of Priceville, assisted by Rev. W. J. Scott of Flesherton, having charge of the service.

To the sorrow stricken husband, family and relatives the community extends sincere sympathy.

The Village Council at the regular meeting held Monday evening passed the necessary by-law in preparation for a local option vote in Markdale. The by-law was passed on instructions of the Liquor Commission to whom the petition of Markdale ratepayers had been presented. The voting will take place on Friday, June 28th, and Village Clerk Lucas has been appointed as Returning Officer. Two polls will be required and Deputy Returning Officers and Poll Clerks will be appointed by the Returning Officer. The 1934 voters' list will be used but provision is made for its revision, notice in which connection will be given in due time.

Mr. Wm. Jackson was appointed to collect arrears of taxes and several accounts were ordered paid.

### Road Will Be Widened

It is quite likely that the single strip of pavement on Highway 10, south of Flesherton, will be constructed full width this summer by the Department of Highways, according to Mr. Roland Patterson, M.P.P. for North Grey. There are around seven miles of pavement that was laid 10 feet in width last summer and this will be made the full width of 20 feet. The single strip has proven very unsatisfactory and the decision will be welcomed by the travelling public. The Highway Department is not embarking on any new road building program but this project is considered necessary.
