A number of friends and neighbours enjoyed a very pleasant evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Vaughan on Friday evening.

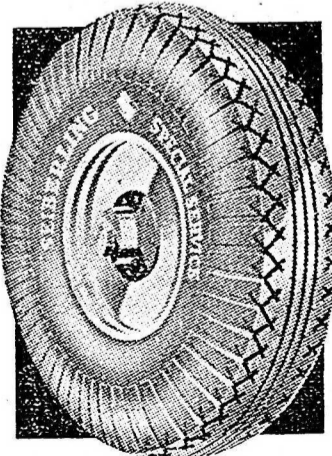

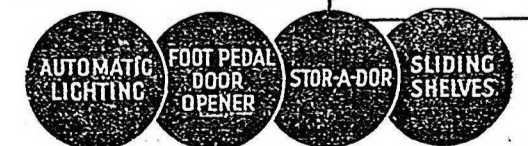
