Live Stock Market

by Dunn & Leveck, Toronto

Under a moderate supply of cattle, the market has recovered considerably, especially on choice butchers, while heavy steers met with better trade at steady prices, some of the best selling at from 6½ to 7; fair to good 5½ to 6¼. In the butcher section, choice handy weight cattle were in strong demand at from 6¼ to 6¾; fair to good from 5½ to 6¼; common and medium 4½ to 5¼. Choice baby heaves, sold at from 7 to 7½; others lower according to quality. Stockers and feeders held steady, best select light weight cattle from 4 to 4½; feeders from 3½ to 5¼. The cow trade was active and strong, choice fat cows selling from 4½ to 5 cents; fair to good from 3½ to 4¼; common and medium 2½ to 3¼; canners and cutters 1½ to 2¼. The bull trade has been slow and lower, choice bulls from 3¼ to 3½ and bolognas at 3 cents.

The lamb market has held active and steady, choice lambs selling at 9½ cents. Farmers will be well advised to ship their lambs as soon as they are fat and ready to go forward. Choice light sheep sold at from 2½ to 3 cents. The calf market has held active and strong with a demand from American buyers which gave considerable support to the market as a whole.

Further gains were made in hog prices Monday and Tuesday, advancing on Monday and again on Tuesday when hogs sold on a basis of \$9.10 to \$9.15 f.o.b. and \$9.50 for truck deliveries.
