The School Fairs

The prize lists for the School Fairs to be held in Grey County in the fall have been distributed to the pupils of the schools by the Department of Agriculture. This will enable those who desire to work at exhibits, etc., in the holidays to do so and, as the Art and Writing have to be handed in to the Department of Agriculture before July 1st to be judged by the School Inspectors during the summer, it will lessen the work in the fall.

This year's prize list appears to be a very comprehensive one, as besides the usual exhibits and contests it has several additional features. As last year, the Continental Life Assurance Company, Owen Sound, is offering prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$2 for the five best original reasons why a person should buy life insurance, to be handed in before July 1st by pupils 10 to 14 years.

Among the additional features of this year's list may be noted the impromptu speeches by pupils, a spelling match, judging of grain by boys, arranging flowers and making a button hole by girls as well as a baseball tournament.

The T. Eaton Co. Ltd. are again offering a silver trophy (Sheffield reproduction) engraved with the winner's name to the pupil winning the highest number of points at each school fair in the county and a book to the second and third highest. Last year this trophy, which was a silver fruit dish, was won at the local fair by Eileen Kinney, then age 12, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Kinney of Markdale and a pupil in the senior fourth class of the Markdale Public School. At each of the two previous year's fairs Eileen won one of the Eaton books. This silver trophy is always a very coveted award and represents much time and labour spent by those who try for it, so the competition to win such a prize is usually very keen.

The application for seeds this year for the School Fairs from 220 school rooms exceeds that of any previous year, so with 20 School Fairs in Grey this fall it shows that the interest along this line continues to increase as the public realize the great educational advantages of these fairs.
