Grey-Bruce Liberals Held Annual Meet

Declaring he did not see where any important legislation could emanate from a third or fourth party as he affirmed his belief in the two party system of government, Hon. J. A. Faulkner, Ontario Minister of Health, speaking before a large and representative gathering of Liberals of Grey-Bruce riding at their annual meeting in Durham Town Hall on Wednesday afternoon, strongly urged a return of Liberal policies to Canada to bring about desired improvement in economic conditions. He accused Hon. H. H. Stevens of "stabbing" his former leader Hon. R. B. Bennett in the back and "double-crossing" him to promote his own ends, after giving full support to the Conservative Government until a few months ago.

Dr. T. H. Sneath, Durham, president of the local association, presided and called upon Col. F. Hunter, M.L.A. for St. Patrick riding, Toronto, to introduce the guest speaker, Dr. W. A. Hall, Liberal candidate in the three-cornered contest in this riding, spoke briefly and was loudly applauded as he bespoke confidence of victory for himself and the Liberal party in the coming Federal election. He voiced a strong preference for Bennett over Stevens as he had no faith in what the latter would do, though he thought neither would command a large following in the next house.

On the motion of J. A. Patterson of Hanover and Dr. McArthur of Markdale, Dr. Sneath and W. E. Harris were re-elected president and secretary respectively. New vice-presidents named were Dr. Griffen of Chatsworth; Mrs. Gruetzner of Hanover, and Dr. W. C. Pickering of Durham. In his introductory remarks President Sneath referred to the loss the association had suffered in the death of their vice-president, J. H. Hunter, who for a long period had been active in Liberal interests.

After first referring to the pleasure of his Durham reception, Hon. Dr. Faulkner touched on some of the activities of the Ontario Legislature dealing particularly with the Dept. of Health under his charge. Here, one of the first acts was dispensing with district health officers at a saving of \$40,000 with no disturbance to the welfare of the people. He announced their intention of appointing four extra tubercular clinics to cover the province in an adequate way. (At the close of his address, Dr. Sneath told the Health minister he would like to see the Durham hospital included in the itinerary of one of these clinics.) These clinics would cost considerable, the Cabinet Minister stated, but from an economic viewpoint it would be money well spent, as tuberculosis now costs the province over \$3,000,000 a year. Ontario had eleven mental institutions maintained at a daily cost of \$12,000. Mention was made of the establishment of a unit to examine mentally ill persons instead of a jail as formerly, feeling that these persons deserved similar treatment as those with physical ailments.

He congratulated the town on the local Hospital which he had visited, and related the heavy costs of hospitalization the Government pays in relief cases. Mention of relief led the speaker to severely castigate some of the unemployed who did not want work, at a time when farmers needed men, as well as the paid agitators who roamed the country.

In the Dominion arena, Dr. Faulkner pointed out that Bennett's trade policies had proved disastrous to Canada and recent surtaxes on Canadian products by Japan and France had further affected Canadian industries. The policy of the Liberal party was not only close relationship in trade with British countries, but with all the world. "Open up the avenues of trade, and prosperity will then come to Canada" averred the Minister. "Goods produced in Canada must be sold elsewhere and goods which we can't produce must be brought in." HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA

While hot, add 1½ cups of granulated sugar and the juice of 2 lemons. Stir well until sugar is dissolved; fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water; otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped ice.
