Wm. Sharples Drowned at Meaford

Meaford was thrown into mourning early Saturday afternoon when it became known that William Sharples, a very highly esteemed resident of the town, had been drowned by falling off the east breakwater while engaged in wheeling cement for the harbor repairs being carried on by the King Construction Co. The work has been going on for several weeks and was completed on Tuesday, and the accident is the more regretted on that account. It appears that Mr. Sharples was wheeling a barrow of cement along the edge of the pier when the barrow and the victim slipped over the edge into some 20 feet of water. Unfortunately the man did not come up, giving rise to the belief that he had been struck and stunned in the mishap. A fellow-workman, Mr. Albert Craig, was fortunate man never made any outcry, and as he slipped he uttered the word "Oh." A number of workmen quickly got ropes, poles, etc., in order to give assistance when the man appeared but he never came to the surface. Owing to the depth of the water there was no person present who could dive deep enough to rescue the victim and it was some 15 minutes before the body was recovered. Drs. Eagles and Sturgeon worked over the victim for half an hour with no signs of life. Coroner F. L. Eberhart was called and the body removed to Gardiner's Undertaking Parlors. After conferring with Crown Attorney it was decided death was due to accidental that drowning and an inquest was not deemed necessary.

The late Mr. Sharples came to England some eight or nine years ago and have resided here ever since. He was a miner before coming to Canada and was of a reserved disposition and a good workman. Very deep sympthy goes out to Mrs. Sharples in her very sad loss.
