## Live Stock Market

Almost 7,000 cattle arrived for Monday's market which was far too many for the present demand and this fact combined with the very hot weather has lowered prices on the market excepting on cattle of choice quality, for which there was a ready demand. The offering consisted of a large number of stockers and feeders and these met with a fair inquiry and prices were considered good. There were no shipments to the United States this week, excepting three carloads of choice veal calves.

Best heavy steers sold at from 6 1/2 to 6 3/4, good to choice from 6 to 6 1/2. In the butcher section choice handy weight butchers brought from 5 1/2 to 6 cents, fair to good from 5 1/4 to 5 1/2, common to medium from 4 3/4 to 5 cents. Choice baby heaves were strong selling at from 7 to 8 1/2, best stockers brought from 4 1/2 to 4.85, others lower according to quality. The cow trade was lower, butcher cows selling at 3 1/2, fair to good from 2 3/4 to 3 1/4. The bull trade was lower, best bulls selling at from 3 to 3 1/2, bolognas mostly 2 1/4.

The lamb market is active and higher, prices advancing one half on Monday morning and holding strong to-day, Tuesday. Best ewe lambs sold at 7 1/2. The sheep trade was strong. The calf market was some-what lower with best veal calves selling at from 7 to 7 1/2, fair to good from 6 1/4 to 7 cents, common and medium 5 1/2 to 6.

The hog market was inclined to ease off a little which was more or

less to be expected on account of the quick advances made in prices during the past week. Supplies of logs were heavy on Monday, sales were made on the basis of from 9.65 to 9.75 for truck deliveries and to-day, Tuesday, the market held much the same.

## Achievement Day in Grey County

Forty-one girls completed the clothing project in Grey County and twenty exhibited their dresses and record books at the Grey County Girls' Achievement Day, held at the Department of Agriculture, Mark-dalle, on Friday, August 16th.

These projects are a part of a pro-gram designed to train girls in prac-tical work in sewing. Certain lead-ers are selected by the Institute branch at meetings held earlier in the summer. The leaders oversee the girls at all meetings regularly held throughout the term of the project.

Girls are divided into two groups. Those under fifteen years and those over fifteen years. There were eight juniors and twelve in the senior group completed last week at Mark-dale. Owing to sickness or no means of transportation, the remainder of the girls could not come.

The girls took part in a Judging Competition as follow-up work. In-cidentally this method is used to se-lect the members of the Girls' Team which will represent Grey County at the Canadian National Exhibition. This competition included scoring dresses according to general appear-ance; workmanship and economy; and making of a button hole. All this will be done at Toronto in com-petition with other county girls.

During the afternoon the twenty members present with their leaders discussed girls' problems and scored all the twenty dresses. They then paraded before the twenty or more visitors who came to see the work. Each girl told the cost of her gar-ment.

The members selected to repre-sent Grey County are as follows: Mrs. G. S. Riddell, Durham, No. 1, member of the Edge Hill Club; Miss Mary Martin, member of the Bognor Club; and Miss Evelyn Lee, member of the New England Club. These girls go to Toronto Canadian Nation-al Exhibition on Tuesday, Sept. 3rd, and judge the following day.

The success of the project is due to the untiring efforts of the leaders of these clubs: Mrs. Russell Graham, Miss Alice Breadner, Miss Alice Frizzell and Mrs. G. S. Riddell, and Miss Flora Durnin, Institutes branch, Parliament Buildings, Tor-onto.

Nor should we forget to mention the members of the Senior Institutes and parents who were willing to al-low the girls to participate in the work and encouraged them to do so. It is a real success. Congratulations Girls, Leaders and Mothers.
