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## ARTEMESIA COUNCIL

Artemesia Council met at Flesherton on Monday, Aug. 12th, with the members all present and the Reeve, Mr. J. A. Davis, in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

By-law No. 972, appointing A. B. Chard as Collector, was passed, and By-law No. 973, levying the following rates: County 13.5 mills, Township 4 mills, general school rate 6.3 mills, was introduced and laid over.

under 18 years and seven grooms of 80 or more years.

Of the 22,587 couples only two men refused to state their ages and four women kept this fact a secret.

The most popular combination of ages was a groom of 21 marrying a bride of 18. There were 407 of those marriages. Next most popular was a groom of 21 and a bride of 19, there being 346 such marriages.

One woman between 56 and 59 married a man of 22; and one woman of 46 married a youth of 18.

One man of 50 or over married a woman of 75 or over.

There were 29 men between 65 and 69 who married women between 60 and 64.

Two men between 60 and 64 married girls of 21.

Of the seven grooms of 80 and over, one bride was between 50 and 54; one between 55 and 59; two between 60 and 64; two between 65 and 69; and one of 75 or over.

Of the 42 grooms between 75 and 79 one married a girl of 23 and the next youngest bride was 38, with most of the brides being over 55.

In many marriages the bride was older than the groom. There were 137 brides of 23 years who married grooms of 22 years; 93 brides of 24 married grooms of 22 years; four brides of 34 years married grooms of 23 years.

From the public platform it is frequently said that the depression has made people marry later in life. But the official record does not bear this out. It shows the popular age for marrying is still between 18 and 24.

These figures are contained in the tabulated returns for the year 1933, which have just been completed by the Ontario Government and published in report form.

Of the total of 22,587 marriages, there were 2,093 brides of 19 years of age; 2,067 of 21 years; 2,066 of 20 years; 2,047 of 18 years; 1,968 of 22 years; 1,728 of 23 years; and there were 106 brides under 16 years, and six brides of 75 years or over. The other brides were of various ages between 16 and 75.

Of the 22,587 grooms, there were 1,928 of 23 years; 1,855 of 24 years; 1,824 of 21 years; 1,819 of 22 years; and there were 34 grooms
