## Live Stock Market

With another very heavy supply of cattle of almost 7,000 head for Monday's market, the trade was not as active as compared to the past few weeks, excepting for cattle of choice quality and good butcher cows which held steady while stockers and feeders featured the cattle division, prices advancing from 15 to 25 cents. The offerings consisted of almost 3,000 cattle from Western Canada which were mostly of the stocker and feeder classes.

Choice heavy steers sold from 6 1/2 to 7 cents with fair to good kind at from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2. In the butcher section baby beefs again met with a strong demand, top ones being made from 8 to 8 1/2, others lower according to quality. Choice handy weight butcher steers and heifers sold at from 5 1/2 to 6.15 with the bulk of the sales ranging from 5 to 5 1/2. Butcher cattle of medium quality were fully 25 cents lower, selling from 4 to 5 cents. The cow trade was active and strong, best fat cows making from 3 1/2 to 4 cents, fair to good from 3 to 3 1/2, common and medium 2 1/2 to 2 3/4, canners and cutters 1 1/2 to 2. The bull trade held steady, bolognas selling from 2 1/2 to 2 3/4, choice butcher bulls from 3 1/4 to 4 cents.

The lamb market again held firm with best lambs selling at 7 cents and bucks mostly 6 cents. The sheep trade was stronger light sheep bring from 3 to 3 1/2. Calf prices advanced on Monday to a top of 10 cents but eased slightly to-day, Tuesday, choice calves selling from 9 to 9 1/2, fair to good from 8 to 9, common and medium 6 1/2 to 7 1/2, grass calves 4 cents.

The hog market held active and strong on Monday sales being made from 9.50 to 9.60. Tuesday, the market held steady under moderate offerings. It will depend a great deal upon supplies as to what prices will be for the balance of the week.

## Crash Victims Buried at Tara Saturday

Slowly, reverently, the bodies of Thomas D. Crawford, James and Austin Sherreff were laid to rest in Tara on Saturday afternoon amid a drizzle of rain while the last rites of the United Church were observed before a gathering of over 300 people and the final chapter of a horrible accident story was finished.

Hundreds of citizens of Allenford and its surrounding territory gathered in and about the United Church there as the funeral service for the three men who died early Thursday morning when their automobile crashed into a C.N.R. motor train near Theford was conducted by Rev. A. W. Fosbury, pastor of the Allenford United Church, assisted by Rev. Mr. Mercer of Holstein.

Before the altar of the church the bodies of the three men, in flower-covered caskets, were placed. Around them were placed still more flowers.

While hundreds of people stood in the rain the minister conducted separate services over the graves of Thomas Crawford and James and Austin Sherreff, as the caskets were lowered. At the grave of Thomas Crawford the Orange Order of the district conducted the Orange burial service.

Pallbearers for Thos. Crawford were six nephews, Clarence Fenton, Holstein, William Crawford, Ernest Crawford, Lawrence Crawford, all of Allenford, Ernest Bradley of Berkeley, and Carl Bradley of Toronto.
