# To the Voters of Markdale

We had no thought of engaging in any Press Controversy on the demerits of the beverage room but the articles inserted by the Moderation League have necessitated a reply.

Nor have we any desire to wound the sensibilities of any parties concerned. For this reason we have purposely avoided in the press making any personalities or any reference to incidents that have occurred either within or without the beverage room, although plenty such could be quoted (since each succeeding day serves but to increase their number) as damaging evidence of the fact that the beverage room is a menace to the morals of all self-respecting citizens.

The local Moderation League have complained of the expense of the voting to the municipality and have referred to the revenue to the municipality from the sales of beverage. Is there not grave probability that the village will be called upon to provide relief for some patrons of the beverage room who are spending their earnings there?

And further, if the voting were held as suggested by the Moderation League in conjunction with the Municipal Elections (re which there is no certainty of such being held) there would be little, if any, saving of expenses because the costs could not be combined, as this is being held under the direction of the Liquor Control Board of Ontario and has therefore no connection with the expenses of a Municipal Election.

In corroboration of certain figures appearing in our last week's article, we beg of you to note these authenticated facts as published in the Toronto Globe of Thursday, September 5th.—

## "Drys Win in 36 Local Option Votes"

"In the twelve months ending Aug. 31st, 1935, fifty-five municipalities in Ontario had local option votes. The drys have won in thirty-six and the wets in nineteen.

Two of the votes concerned liquor stores. In these each side won one.

In thirty-nine places the wets attacked the existing local option law and won in seven. In thirty-two the drys maintained the local option law.

In fourteen places the drys attacked existing beverage rooms. In three they won with the required 60 per cent. majority. In eight of these the dry vote was in the majority but fell below 60 per cent. In three places only of the fourteen with existing beverage rooms did the majority of the voters desire to continue them.

Of the total vote on beverage rooms in the fifty-three municipalities (leaving aside the contests on stores) 55.9 per cent. was dry."
