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Grey-Bruce Nomination Held Monday

There was a big crowd present at the Durham town hall on Monday when the official nominations were made for the federal riding of Grey-Bruce. Three names were placed in nomination: Miss Agnes C. Macphail, the sitting member for South-east Grey; Dr. W. A. Hall, Liberal member for South Bruce, and L. G. Campbell, Conservative of Markdale. Mr. R. T. Edwards, the returning Officer, was in charge of the official nomination and presided during the afternoon while Miss Macphail and Dr. Campbell addressed those who were fortunate enough to get into the hall.

The gathering was so large that not more than one half of those in attendance were able to gain admission. Miss Macphail spoke first and devoted considerable of her time to Dr. Hall, who was not present. She also criticized the policy of the Bennett government and their record during the past five years. Dr. Campbell upheld the Bennett government and enumerated several of the acts which have been passed since 1930, particularly those from which the farming community have benefitted. He appealed to the electors for support on the record of the Bennett administration and on the program of reform which is now being worked out.

Following the public meeting Dr. Campbell and his supporters enjoyed a banquet in the hall at which all parts of the riding were represented. Following the supper, provided by the Red Cross Society, short addresses were given by the candidate and several others.

Miss Macphail and Dr. Campbell are holding meetings every night while Dr. Hall is depending more on the personal canvass. He is however holding some public meetings. What the result of the vote on Oct. 14th will be is keeping all parties interested and all are confident of success. We will make our predictions on Oct. 15th.

Mrs. Andrew Rutledge Passed Away

Death removed one of Ceylon's oldest and most respected citizens late Tuesday, Sept. 24th, in the person of Mrs. Mary Jane Kennedy, widow of the late Andrew Rutledge at the age of 76.

Mrs. Rutledge was a daughter of the late Malcolm and Margaret Kennedy and was born on the East Backline on the Kennedy farm where she spent her earlier years. She was married Jan. 31st, 1883 to her late husband and they lived in the vicinity, later moving to the village where she continued to reside.

A family of nine children blessed their union, six of which predeceased their mother. Following the death of her husband in April 1930, their son, Edmund, died in October 1908, Forbes in 1915, Margaret (Mrs. Jaynes) in 1916, William in 1918, Ida (Mrs. Daley) in 1918 and Leslie in 1931. Mr. Roy Rutledge of Lethbridge, Alta., Mr. Melville Rutledge of Macleod, Alta., Mr. Robert Rutledge of Holland Centre, also grandson, Mr. George Jaynes, who has resided with his grandmother since infancy, are the sole surviving members.

Mrs. Rutledge also leaves one sister, Miss Bella Kennedy who resided with her, two brothers, William and Andrew and a sister, Eliza (Mrs. John Kennedy) had predeceased her.

Mrs. Rutledge was a woman of kindly disposition endearing her to her many friends. She was devoted to her family and church and took an active part in the activities of the church. She had been confined to her bed seriously ill for over two years but had recovered sufficiently to be around again. Just a week ago her condition again became serious and although her death was not unexpected it came as a great shock to her many friends.

The funeral took place Thursday to Flesherton cemetery when Rev. W. J. Scott of the United Church of which she was a member had charge of the service. Mr. Scott spoke of the unfaltering faith of the deceased throughout her long period of sickness and suffering and also referred to the two absent members of the family in Alberta who were unable to be present.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Frank and George Cairns, George Snell, Roy Piper, George Arrow-smith, and Sangster Hemphill. Interment took place in Flesherton cemetery.

John Arthur Hale of Feversham

After only a short illness death came on Thursday afternoon, Sept. 19th, to John Arthur Hale, well known Osprey township citizen, at the age of 58 years. Deceased had been undergoing treatment in the Collingwood hospital, but his condition steadily grew worse from internal hemorrhages until death intervened Thursday.

The late Mr. Hale was a son of the late George and Isobel Hale, pioneers of Osprey, and was born at Wareham. He received a college education and spent his early life teaching, later taking up farming. He made many warm friends and was held in the highest esteem by all with whom he came in contact. He leaves to mourn two sisters and three brothers: Mrs. A. E. Bell of Wiseton, Sask., who arrived a week ago and remained at his bedside most of the time and was there when he passed away, Miss Mary Hale and Herbert who resided with him at his home one mile east of Feversham on the 8th, Harry of Sudbury and Fred on the old home west of Feversham. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and also of Saugeen lodge, I.O.O.F. at Markdale. He was particularly active in local affairs of his district, but never sought any municipal office.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, Sept. 21st, from the home of his brother, Fred. Rev. Clifton of Feversham conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Kingsley Cutler. Interment took place in Feversham cemetery.

Hanover won the Boys' cup and Durham the Girls'. The senior boys' silver medal was won by C. Laidlaw of Hanover, while the Senior Girls' silver medal was tied between Jean Rowe of Durham and Eula Lockhart of Dundalk. The bronze medal will be presented to M. Hawton of Dundalk and the same was won by Alice Cutler of Markdale, in the Senior Girls' division. In the Junior Boys' section there was a tie for the silver medal between B. Whitacre of Durham and J. Grandy of Hanover. A tie also occurred with the Junior Boys for the bronze medal, with K. Schaeffer of Hanover and D. Scott of Flesherton being the winners. For the Junior Girls Betty MacIntyre of Durham captured the silver medal and Grace Miller of Chatsworth the bronze.

In the number of points Hanover stood highest with a total of 54; Durham second with 39 and Markdale third with 20.
