

John A. Perry Died Suddenly

The sudden and unexpected death of John A. Perry of Fairmount occurred at his home about eight o'clock Sunday morning from a heart attack after some three and a half hours' illness. Deceased was in town on Saturday evening and transacted business in Meaford stores until about seven o'clock. He was apparently in the best of health, and during the early hours of Sunday Drs. W. L. Sturgeon and A. S. Eagles were hurriedly summoned to his home and his death followed a few hours later.

The late Mr. Perry was born in Euphrasia township, near Rocklyn, a son of the late James Perry, nearly 63 years ago, and resided all his life in that neighborhood. He was a successful farmer, a shrewd business man and one with whom it was a pleasure to deal. Besides giving attention to his own affairs he served on the Rocklyn Agricultural Board for some 25 years and was president of that organization in 1932-33 and gave good service. He also acted as Euphrasia Road Superintendent for the past five years and filled the position with credit to himself and satisfactory results to the township. He was a member of the Rocklyn Orange Lodge, a member of Victoria United Church, and gave every support to the well-being of the community. In politics he was a Conservative and worked hard for the cause when such policies were in accord with his views. Some thirty-eight years ago the late Mr. Perry was married to Miss Sarah Jane Lanktree, also of Euphrasia, who survives with a family of two sons: Vernon, who resides on an adjoining farm, and Gordon, on the homestead. He is also survived by a brother and sister: William L. Clarke, Euphrasia, and Mrs. R. B. Clarke, Lewvan, Sask. This is the third death in the Perry family in the past seven months. A brother, Thomas, died in Lewvan, Sask. and Mrs. James A. Smith, St. Vincent, being the other two. Two brothers, Robert and Fred, died some years ago.

The funeral was held from his late residence, lot 24, con. 5, Euphrasia, on Tuesday afternoon to Lakeview cemetery and was one of the largest in the township for many years. Service was conducted by Rev. Scott Milley, pastor of Victoria Church, and Rev. J. R. Wilkinson of Winton, a former pastor, and Rev. H. K. L. Charlton, Clarksburg, Rocklyn Orange Lodge, with visiting members from Kimberley and Grierstville lodges, attended in a body. A eulogy, "God's Way is the Best Way", was given by members of Victoria choir.

The pallbearers were his six nephews: Alonzo and Aubrey Smith, Wm. Lanktree, Edward Lanktree, Earl Cook and Bruce Myles.
