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## Woman Killed and Husband Injured in Auto - Train Crash

Mrs. Douglas Maynard of Leamington was killed and her husband seriously injured on Wednesday when their automobile was struck by the C.P.R. mixed train at the railway crossing near the Glen in Glenside township.

Mr. Maynard was taken to Durham hospital suffering from a broken knee cap, severe head injuries, concussion and shock.

Dr. Brad. Jamieson, coroner, will hold an inquest at Durham on Friday.

Mr. and Mrs. Maynard were on their way to Markdale to visit with Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Robertson and were expected to arrive here about 12.30 o'clock. The Robertsons were watching for them to arrive when word of the accident was received and they left immediately for Durham.

The crossing where the accident occurred is a dangerous one, as it is impossible to see a train which is coming from Saugeen Junction until you are almost on the tracks. The view is obstructed by the trees in a cemetery which is located west of the crossing.

## Markdale Won Game But Lost Round

Outscoring the visitors 6-3 Markdale juveniles came within one goal of tying up the round in the second game of their Tri-County Juvenile series with Owen Sound Juvenile All-Stars here Thursday evening. The Owen Sounders had earned a four-goal lead in Owen Sound on Tuesday evening, when they defeated their lead here Thursday night, as the Markdale kids turned in a fine game, twice tying the score on the round. The Owen Sound team now meets Barrie-Allandale in the second game, having previously earned a six goal lead.

Thursday's game was strenuous, but not dirty. Territorial play was fairly even, but the shooting of the visitors was off and they could not beat Ferris, who turned in a remarkable game in the net. K. MacLeod also played well in the Owen Sound net, but found the fighting far from his liking and had difficulty stopping Markdale shots from outside the defence, the locals getting all their goals on shots of this nature.

Phillips got the first counter for Markdale, beating MacLeod with a hard shot from the blue line after taking a pass from Dundas. York got another goal for the home squad before the first quarter ended, taking a pass from Patton and shooting from fairly close in. In the second period Phillips took a pass from Patton and scored on a long shot from about centre.

Soon after the third period started Phillips tied the score on the round when he beat MacLeod after taking a pass from Dundas. Barber then counted for the visitors, unassisted, but King tied the score on the round once more at the beginning of the fourth period with a strange goal, the ball going up among the rafters of the rink, coming down and hitting K. MacLeod on the back and going into the net. Grasser then took a pass from Lee to put the visitors back into the lead and they increased their margin when Lee was awarded a penalty shot and scored. The final goal of the game was scored by Phillips whose pass from centre to York near the crease went into the goal as York blocked MacLeod's view.

There were six penalties, evenly divided, King, Akitt and Dundas drawing the Markdale penalties and Grasser, Yeo and K. MacLeod the Owen Sound penalties. MacLeod drew his penalty near the end of the game and for the half-minute of play remaining J. MacLeod took his place in the net.

Markdale people were shocked early Monday forenoon when the news spread that Cecil Alton had passed away about eight o'clock that morning. He had been unwell for a week or so but his condition was not considered serious and he was about the house on Sunday. During the night he became worse and became unconscious in the early morning hours.

Mr. Alton was raised here and was widely known and highly esteemed. In his young manhood days he was active in all lines of sport and was a member of Markdale's championship lacrosse team some years ago. For the past few years he had acted as village constable and his services will be much missed. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Alton and came to Markdale with his parents about 50 years ago from England. He was 54 years of age.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Annie Staples, and four children, Cecil, Florence, Ruth and Fred, all at home. There are also one sister, Mrs. W. J. Hamilton, of this place, and three brothers, George of Markdale and Arthur and Oscar at Strongfield, Sask. Mr. J. E. Matson of this place is a half brother.

The funeral is being held this (Wednesday) afternoon with service in Annesley United Church and burial in Markdale Cemetery.

## Thomas R. McKenzie Died Thursday

Thomas Robertson McKenzie, 78, died at his home at Portlaw, where he had lived for the past 45 years on Thursday afternoon, Oct. 3rd. He had been in poor health for some time and his death was not unexpected.

One of the most prominent figures in municipal life in Grey, Mr. McKenzie was a councillor and reeve of Artemesia township for many years and culminated his public life by serving as Warden of the County of Grey in 1925. His interest in public life began when he was a young man and for a period of 21 years he served the Artemesia council, first as councillor, later and for quite a number of years as reeve, during which time he capably looked after the affairs of the township and ably represented it through his seat in the county council. His fine record of service was appreciated by his election to the Warden's chair.

Mr. McKenzie was a native of Artemesia, born on the homestead of his father, four miles south of Markdale 78 years ago. Forty-five years ago he moved his family to Portlaw and it was there he died. He was married 40 years ago to Mary Carr who survives with one daughter, Lillian, Mrs. Herbert J. Walker of Portlaw, and one son, Alvin, at home. There also remains one brother, Roderick, on the old homestead.

Mr. McKenzie was a life-long member of the Methodist and later the United Church in Flesherton and for 41 years was clerk of the session. A bitter opponent of the liquor traffic, he fought it for many years and was finally, during one of his terms as reeve, successful in having local option established in Artemesia. A highly respected citizen, his death will be mourned by hundreds of friends.

The funeral was held on Saturday, Oct. 5th at 1.45 p.m. at his home at Portlaw, from where the body was taken to St. John's United Church, Flesherton, for a public service. Burial was made in Flesherton cemetery. Many former associates in the County Council joined neighbors and friends at the burial service.

## Mrs. Emma McMillan Died in Detroit

Mrs. Emma McMillan, mother of Mrs. Harry Noble of this place, passed peacefully away on Friday afternoon, Oct. 4th, at the home of her daughter, Miss Margaret McMillan, Reg.N., of Detroit, with whom, for the past six years she had made her home. The late Mrs. McMillan was 88 years of age last August, and though falling for some years, was wonderfully bright and active until a few months ago when she suffered a paralytic stroke. Though her death was not unexpected, yet to her scattered family it brought shock and sorrow. She was a well known and highly respected resident of this village for many years.

Mrs. McMillan was born in England and came to Canada with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Chapman, when a little girl. They settled in Bruce County, not many miles from Kincardine, where she grew up. Following her public school course she attended Grammar school at Kincardine and secured a certificate to teach school, which she did for some years and until her marriage to Mr. Alexander McMillan. Following their marriage they farmed successfully near the town of Ripley. To them were born ten children, two sons and eight daughters, all of whom survive, with the exception of Jas. A. McMillan of Cleveland, O., who passed away eight years ago. Their father, Mr. Alexander McMillan, died about 42 years ago. Some years after his death, Mrs. McMillan sold the farm and moved with the younger members of her family to Markdale and purchased a residence on Mary St.

She was a very active member and worker for many years in Cooke's Presbyterian Church and was particularly interested in the work of the Woman's Missionary Society. To her it was a pleasure to prepare papers for the program and to help provide suitable clothing for the bales sent to the west each year. She was clever with her needle and before advancing years made sewing and fancy work difficult many a helping hand she gave to those with less ability or time to provide for the needs of their families.
