### Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were not quite so heavy this week and the market has held on a steady basis. The outlet for stockers and feeders tinues to feature the market, sales being made on a higher level compared to finished cattle.

There were 6,000 cattle on sale on Monday, 4,500 of which came Western Canada, consisting largely of stockers and feeders besides a large number of medium to good butcher cattle. Choice heavy steers sold at from 5% to 6 cents while best butcher cattle ranging from 434 to 5 cents with the bulk of the sales being made at from 414 to 434. Choice baby beeves held steady at from 7 to 8 cents with a few tops up to \$1/2. Stockers and feeders of select quality sold at from 4 to 5 cents, common and medium 31/4 to 33/4. The cow trade held steady, choice fat cows making 31/2, fair to good from 23/4 to 31/4, common and medium 24 to 234, canners and cutters 11/2 to 2. Bolog na bulls at from 3 to 314 and choice

butcher bulls from 31/2 to 31/4. Supplies of lambs have been ceptionally light for this time of the year and the market held active and strong, the bulk of the best lambs selling at 6% with a few extra choice at 7 cents. Choice light sheep made from 3 to 31/2. Choice veal calves were in strong demand at from 9 to 91/2 cents, fair to good from 8 to 9 cents, common and medium 51/2 to 61/2, grass calves 4


