Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were not quite so heavy this week and the market has held on a steady basis. The outlet for stockers and feeders continues to feature the market, sales being made on a higher level compared to finished cattle.

There were 6,000 cattle on sale on Monday, 4,500 of which came from Western Canada, consisting largely of stockers and feeders besides a large number of medium to good butcher cattle. Choice heavy steers sold at from 5 1/4 to 6 cents, while best butcher cattle ranging from 4 1/4 to 5 cents with the bulk of the sales being made at from 4 1/4 to 4 1/2. Choice baby heaves held steady at from 7 to 8 cents with a few tops up to 8 1/2. Stockers and feeders of select quality sold at from 4 to 5 cents, common and medium 3 1/2 to 3 3/4. The cow trade held steady, choice fat cows making 3 1/2, fair to good from 2 1/4 to 3 1/4, common and medium 2 1/4 to 2 1/2, canners and cutters 1 1/2 to 2. Bologna bulls at from 3 to 3 1/4 and choice butcher bulls from 3 1/2 to 3 3/4.

Supplies of lambs have been exceptionally light for this time of the year and the market held active and strong, the bulk of the best lambs selling at 6 1/2 with a few extra choice at 7 cents. Choice light sheep made from 3 to 3 1/2. Choice veal calves were in strong demand at from 9 to 9 1/2 cents, fair to good from 8 to 9 cents, common and medium 5 1/2 to 6 1/2, grass calves 4 cents.

Hogs held steady on Monday and are closing strong today at from 9 1/4 to 9.40 for truck deliveries. Prospects are favourable for the balance of the week.

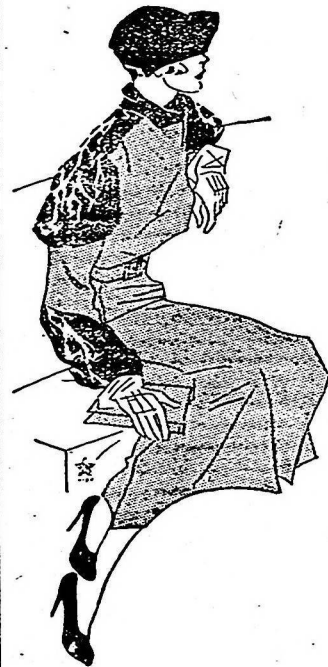
