Live Stock Market

Almost 7000 cattle arrived for Monday's market, over half of which came from Western Canada, consisting mostly of stockers and feeders. The market opened slow for killing cattle, while breedy stockers and feeders changed hands quickly at remarkably good prices. Choice heavy steers were very slow of sale, but those weighing around 1100 pounds were readily taken care of. There were no cattle shipped to the United States, and Old Country markets are not at all favourable at the present time.

Some of the best steers sold at from 5 1/2 to 6 1/4, while choice handyweight butchers ranged from 4 1/2 to 5 1/4; fair to good from 4 to 4 1/2; common and medium 3 1/4 to 3 3/4; boners from 2 1/2 to 3.15. Choice baby beeves sold at from 7 to 8 cents, but there was a wide range in prices on medium to good from 5 to 6 1/2. Selected stockers and feeders sold at from 4 1/4 to 5 cents, others at lower prices according to quality. The cow trade was slightly easier, especially on common kind.

choice from 3 1/4 to 3 3/4; medium to good 2 1/2 to 3 1/4; canners and cutters 1 1/2 to 2 1/4. Choice milch cows and springers sold readily at from \$40 to \$55 each. The bull trade held steady, choice light bulls 3 1/4 to 4 cents, bolognas 2.75 to 3.25.

In spite of a liberal supply of lambs, prices held strong, choice ewes selling at 7 1/4, and bucks 6 1/4. Best light sheep 3 to 3 1/2. The calf trade was stronger, especially on choice light veals from 8 to 8 1/2, with a few tops at 9 cents; fair to good from 7 to 8; common and medium 5 to 6 1/2; heavy calves real slow 4 to 5 cents.

Hog prices have taken a toboggan slide during the past week, and it is felt they have now reached the bottom for the time being at least. Monday's sales were made on the basis of 7 1/2 f.o.b. but another quarter decline was registered on Tuesday, sales being made at 7 1/4 f.o.b., 7.60 for truck deliveries and 8 cents weighed-off-cars. A great deal will depend upon supplies. American markets are much lower, also all Canadian markets and Packing Plants are experiencing heavy receipts.

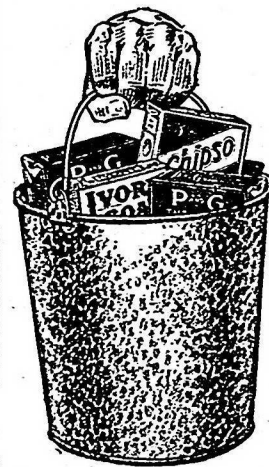
