Live Stock Market

On Monday, there were 6500 cattle on sale, and the market opened very slow and finally cleared a little over half the run by the close. Prices on practically all classes were from 15 to 35 lower. Trade for heavy steers was at a standstill, and only a few choice loads of lighter weights moved to the scales. Stockers and feeders were inclined to slow up from the recent activity shown in this department. One load of good feeders made 5 cents, but the most of the sales ranged around 4 1/2 to 4 3/4.

Best steers weighing from 1050 up sold at from 5 1/2 to 6 cents, with the bulk of the sales from 4 1/2 to 5 1/4. In the butcher section, choice butchers sold at from 4 1/2 to 5 cents, fair to good 3 3/4 to 4 1/4; common

and medium 3 1/4 to 3 3/4. Baby beefs are lower in price, choice from 7 to 7 1/2, others at much lower prices accordingly. Large numbers of medium baby beefs arrived from the West, seriously affecting the trade here. Choice light stockers sold at from 4 to 4 1/2, medium to good from 3 1/2 to 3.90. The cow market was very slow and prices easier, the bulk of the best cows selling from 3 to 3 1/4; fair to good 2 1/2 to 2.90; canners and cutters, 1 1/2 to 2 1/4. Bulls were a half lower, choice from 3 1/4 to 3 1/2, bolognas mostly 2 1/2.

In the small meats, the market was active and strong, choice lambs selling at 7 1/2 with the bucks at 6 1/2. The sheep trade was active and steady. Choice veal calves made from 8 to 9 cents, fair to good from 6 1/2 to 7 1/2; common and medium 5 to 6, grassers 4 cents.

The hog market recovered some of the decline shown at the end of last week, opening on Monday at 7 1/4 f.o.b. and holding strong Tuesday. Truck deliveries ranged from 7.50 to 7.70. It is felt that the market will hold a steady level for the balance of the week.

The market will not be closed on Monday, November 11th.
