Live Stock Market

Following the heavy runs of cattle during the past two months, supplies eased up considerably for the opening market of the week, and killing cattle met with an active trade at higher prices. Stockers and feeders held steady and a ready clearance was made of anything good. Heavy steers were not want-

Best steers weighing around 1100 oounds sold at from 51/2 to 6 cents, fair to good from 41/2 to 51/4. In the butcher section, there was a scarcity of the good kind, choice making from 5 to 51/2; fair to good 4 to 4%; common and medium 314 to 4 cents. Choice baby beeves sold at from 7 to 8, others at lower prices accordingly. Best feeding steers made 5 cents with the bulk of the selected stockers from 4 to 14; medium 31/2 to 4 cents. The cow trade held steady, good to choice from 3 to 31/2; common and medium 2½ to 2½; canners and cutters 1½ to 2½. Choice bulls were steady from 3 to 31/2, bolognas 2½ to 2%. Milch cows and spring-ers in good condition made from \$40 to \$60 each.

Supplies of lambs were moderate for this time of the year, and the market held strong at 71/2 to 71/2 for best ewes, and bucks discounted \$1. Choice light sheep were in strong demand at from 31/2 to 4. The calf market was active, choice from 9 to 91/2, with a few tops at 10 cents; fair to good from 7 to 814; common and medium at 51/2 to 61/2; heavy calves 41/2 to 5 cents; grassers 4 cents.

Hogs held active and strong on Monday, selling at 7.35 to 7.50 f.o. b. and 7.75 to 8.00 for truck deliveries. On Tuesday, buyers were bidding lower, but the market closed steady. A great deal will depend upon supplies, but no change is likely to take place for the balance of this week.


