## Live Stock Market

The cattle market has been slow and prices slightly lower than a week ago, due to heavier receipts. Cattle of choice quality continued to sell at steady prices but those of medium to good quality were lower. Stockers and feeders continued to sell at steady prices. There were no shipments of cattle exported to either the United States or Great Britain.

Choice heavy steers ranged from 5½ to 6 cents, fair to good from 4½ to 5½ cents. Choice handy-weight steers and heifers sold at from 5 to 5½ cents, fair to good from 4½ to 5.40, common and medium 3½ to 4. Choice baby beefs were in strong demand at from 7 to 8 cents, while others of medium to good quality ranged from 5 to 6½ cents. Best light stockers sold at from 4 to 4½ and feeders from 4½ to 5. The cow trade was active and steady, choice from 3½ to 3¾, fair to good from 2¾ to 3¾, common and medium 2.25 to 2.65. Canners and cutters 1½ to 2¼. Choice light butcher bulls sold at from 3½ to 4, best heavies from 3½ to 3¾, bolognas 2.75 to 3.15.

Supplies of lambs continue light for this time of the year and the market has held active and strong, the bulk of the best lambs selling at 8 cents with a few extra choice at 8½. The sheep trade is strong, best light sheep selling from 3½ to 4 cents. Choice veal calves sold readily at from 9 to 9½, fair to good 7½ to 8½, common and medium 5½ to 6½, grassers 4 cts.

Supplies of hogs have been heavy, which is usually the case at this time of the year. Monday sales were made on a basis of \$7 f.o.b., 7.25 to 7.40 for truck deliveries. Tuesday, the market held steady in spite of lower bids. It will depend entirely upon supplies as to what will take place for the balance of the week.
