

## C. R. Itic Goes Hunting and Gets a Deer

Dear Readers.—I was so busy last week deer hunting that I didn't have time to write you but as there was no Standard printed my letter wouldn't have got to you until this week. I hadn't thought of joining in the hunt until Monday when I saw a lot of the fellows around town starting for the tall timbers with rifles and shotguns. After the fever gripped me I began looking for a few reliable partners to join me in forming a party. I interviewed quite a number including Bill Mann, Tom Reburn, Sandy Robertson, Dick Stephen and Walter Perkins but none of them were keen on going and I decided to join one of the parties already organized. I spent Tuesday and Wednesday trying to locate members of the different parties but as they were all in the swamps I was unable to get in touch with them. On Thursday I decided to go along with the first party to leave town in the morning on Friday and set out to procure a gun. I made visits to all of my friends around town but none of them had a gun suitable for deer shooting and again I was out of luck. I went to bed early Thursday night and tried to forget the hunting business but the stories of the early days in the bush came back to me and I remembered that the Indians used the bow and arrow in securing their game. I was up early Friday morning and got Albert Scott to make me a bow out of an old auto spring and several arrows from steel rods and I was ready for the road on Saturday morning. I walked out into Glenelg in the early hours and was ready to join the first party which came along. I saw several car loads go whizzing by but none of them stopped to pick me up so I took to the bush on my own and after walking about for three or four hours I sighted a deer not too far away to be within range of my arrows. I took careful aim and let fly but the arrow went beyond and scared the deer which ran towards me and when it got within a few yards of me I was ready for a second shot and the arrow pierced the heart and we are now provided with meat for the winter season. I returned to town and procured my license and then got Bill Armstrong with his truck to help me bring the carcass into town. I didn't see any of the other fellows with a better deer than I secured and I'll be ready for the first of the season when next year rolls around.
