

Live Stock Market

Monday's cattle supply, made up of the arrival of 4500 head beside a carry-over from last week of 1300 head, proved to be much too heavy for the present demand, which caused a very slow trade and prices on all classes were from 15 to 25 lower. Stockers and feeders, which have featured the market during the fall season, weakened under a liberal supply of common to medium grades of cattle for which there was a very limited demand. A few loads of selected stockers and feeders sold at from 4 to 4 1/2 cents.

Choice heavy steers brought from 5 1/2 to 5.85; fair to good from 4 1/2 to 5 1/4; best butcher cattle went at from 5 to 5 1/4; fair to good 4 1/4 to 4 1/2; common and medium 3 1/2 to 4. A few choice baby heaves made from 7 to 8c.; others lower according to quality. Choice fat cows were slow of sale at from 3 1/2 to 3 3/4; fair to good from 2 3/4 to 3 1/4c. The demand was strong for canners and cutters at from 1 3/4 to 2 1/2c. The bull trade held steady; choice butcher bulls from 3 1/2 to 3 3/4c.; choice heavies from 3 1/4 to 3 1/2c.; bolognas mostly 3c.

Lamb prices made a further advance, choice ewes selling at 8 1/2c. with some of very fancy quality at 8 3/4c. The sheep trade was active and steady, best light sheep from 4 to 4 1/2c. The calf market opened steady with top sales being made at 10c., but the market weakened at the close of the day, choice calves selling from 9 to 9 1/2c.; fair to good from 7 to 8 1/2c.; common and medium 5 1/2 to 6 1/2c.

Hog prices advanced on Monday from 25 to 40 cents, selling from \$7.25 to \$7.40 f.o.b., \$7.60 to \$7.75 off trucks. Prospects for the balance of the week are favorable.

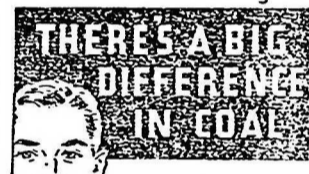
