Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were in keeping with the present demand and prices have been from 25c. to 50c. higher. Choice heavy steers have been in good demand at from 6 to 7c. In the butcher section, choice handy weight steers and heifers made from 5½ to 6c.; fair to good from 4½ to 5½c.; common and medium 4¼ to 4¾c. There was a good demand for choice baby heaves at from 7 to 8c.; others lower according to quality. The cow market was active and higher; choice fat cows from 4 to 4¼c.; fair to good from 3¼ to 3¾c.; common and medium 2½ to 3c. Canners and cutters 1½ to 2½c. Choice heavy bulls sold at from 3¼ to 3¾c.; bolognas 3 to 3¼c.

The lamb market held active and steady. Choice ewes were from 8½ to 9c. Best light sheep sold at from 4 to 4½c. The calf market was active and strong. Choice calves advanced to 11c.; fair to good from 9½ to 10c.; common and medium 7 to 8c.

The hog market held steady on Monday at from \$8.60 to \$8.75 for truck deliveries. On Tuesday the market is slow and closing a quarter lower. Prospects are no better.
