Shortly after the opening of the game Norman Hartley popped a nice one into the Table aggregation's tent for the first counter. Young Winterburn got a second one from close in. The Owen Sound youngsters then got their only counter in the first period. Milton Burnside, playing defence, lifted a nice one from his own blue line and the opposing goalie never saw it until it was in the net. Hartley and Winterburn repeated their former performances and the first period ended: Markdale 5, Owen Sound 1.

The visitors drew first blood in the second spasm with a counter shortly after the commencement of play. York and Hartley each got one but the Sounders came back with two. Noble and King located the net before the end of the period and the score stood: Markdale 9, Owen Sound 4.

The third frame was pretty much all for the visitors. Hartley got the first goal but Owen Sound came right back with three in a row. Then Hartley got another, followed by one for the visitors. The game was over and the score stood: Markdale 11, Owen Sound 8.

SHOP IN MARKDALE.

Ski Championship to be Held in Beaver Valley

The Beaver Valley near Flesherton, perhaps better called "The Valley of Eugenia," now silently asleep under a blanket of snow, will awake on February 23rd and become a mecca for a thousand skiers.

This good news is contained in the January issue of the "Ski Runner," the official publication of the Toronto Ski Club. With the exception of the jumping events, which will be held at Thorncliffe on Saturday afternoon, February 22nd, all other events will be held on the Beaver Valley hills. A Boy Scout should really get there beforehand and notify the Beavers.

The location is ideal for skiing. Not far from Flesherton the valley runs north and south, nestled within towering, snow-laden hills whose summit in places rises to a vertical height of over 500 feet from the base of the valley. In places the pitch is quite steep; but novices should not worry for Mother Nature has arranged for them gradual grades where they can ski with the greatest of ease.

A special train will leave the Union Station at 11 p.m. on Saturday night, February 22nd, and arrive in Flesherton at 1 a.m. After spending the night on the train the skiers, after a "train breakfast," will start at 8 o'clock for the "Valley of Competition." At 9 a.m. the men's cross country race will start. At 10 a.m. the ladies' downhill race will start. At 11.30 a.m. the ladies' slalom race will be staged. Two hours later the men will start their downhill race and at 2 o'clock the ladies' cross country race will be held. An hour later the men's slalom race, the last event on the program, will be run off and the skiers will leave Flesherton for Toronto at 5 p.m.

Dundalk Won Game on Wednesday Evening

Mrs. Eliot Smith Laid to Rest Thursday

Seldom have the village and surrounding communities been so deeply moved as in the death and burial of the late Mrs. Eliot Smith, who passed away on Tuesday morning, Jan. 7th, in the hospital here.

The high esteem and warm affection in which she was held throughout the district and sympathy for the bereaved were clearly evidenced in the large concourse of sorrowing relatives and sympathizing friends, neighbors and acquaintances, who filled the large auditorium of Annesley United Church and gallery for the funeral service on Thursday afternoon last.

A deep hush fell over the large congregation as the casket, preceded by the ministers, was slowly wheeled up the aisle to rest before the altar rail, the many beautiful floral offerings breathing out a silent message of love and sympathy. In hushed tones "Lead Kindly Light Amid the Encircling Gloom" was sung, followed by the reading of St. John, 14th chapter, "Let not your heart be troubled. . . . In my Father's house are many mansions. . . ." by Rev. C. O. Pherrill of Christ Church. Rev. C. C. Wellerman, pastor of Harkaway Church, where, since her marriage, the deceased was a member and taught a class in the Sunday School, offered prayer. A solo, "Some Day", was feelingly sung by Mr. J. H. Dundas.

The sermon by Rev. H. S. Warren, pastor of Annesley United Church, was drawn from the text "Though my father and my mother forsake me, yet the Lord will take me up", and "casting all your care upon Him, for He careth for you". Some of the thoughts brought out and stressed were that God's faithfulness and fidelity are very real and equal to our every need, that he takes constant care of His children and that nothing can separate us from the love of God, through Jesus Christ.

In closing his address he spoke in the highest terms of Mrs. Smith and of the value of her services. Hers was a noble soul. Mention of her happy smile, cheery words, her idealism and service in the various organizations of the Church, and the large place she filled in the community life, found an echo in the hearts of his listeners. The service was closed by Rev. W. G. Wakefield of Holland Centre, a former pastor of Harkaway Church, who announced the closing hymn, "Nearer My God to Thee", and pronounced the benediction.

Mrs. Smith, previous to her marriage, was Miss Myrtle Freeman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Freeman, whose home is about three miles east of Markdale. She is survived by her husband and infant son, William Eliot, also her parents, two brothers, Russell and Roy, and sister, Alice.
