## Live Stock Market

Although supplies of cattle were of moderate volume for Monday's market, the trade was slow, excepting for choice baby heaves and fat cows. Choice heavy steers sold at from 6.25 to 6.75, fair to good from 5.25 to 5.90. Choice handy weight butcher steers and heifers ranged from 5.50 to 5.75, fair to good from 4.75 to 5.35, common and medium 3.75 to 4.50. Prime baby heaves were in strong demand at from 7.50 to 8.50, others lower according to quality. The cow trade held active and strong, choice from 4.00 to 4.25, fair to good from 3.25 to 3.90, common and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. The bull trade held steady, choice light butcher bulls from 3.75 to 4.25, choice heavies from 3.25 to 4.00, bolognas 3.00 to 3.50.

The lamb market was slow and lower, choice lambs selling at from 8.50 to 8.75. The sheep trade held steady, choice light butcher sheep from 4.00 to 4.50, heavy sheep from 2.50 to 3.50. The calf market opened very slow and prices on best calves were fully 50 to 1.00 lower, top sales being made at from 9.50 to 10.00, fair to good calves from 8.00 to 9.50, common and medium 7.00 to 8.00.

Supplies of hogs were much too heavy over the week-end, with the result that packers bids were much lower. To-day, Monday, closing sales were made at 8.00 F.O.B. and from 8.25 to 8.40 for truck deliveries. It is quite possible that prices may be lower for the balance of the week.
