CEYLON

The first meeting of the Women's Institute since the New Year was held at the home of Mrs. Sinclair with a record attendance of nine members and seven visitors present. The President, Mrs. Geo. Snell, opened the meeting with the Ode, followed by the Lord's Prayer repeated in unison. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mrs. Sinclair in the absence of the Secretary, and these were approved. Papers on "Institute Work" and "Cobourne Lodge" were read by Mrs. Sinclair and Frances Collinson. It was decided that each member should bring material to the next meeting and start a quilt. The February meeting will be held at Mrs. Harry Piper's. Lunch was served at the close of the meeting.

The Ladies' Aid meets at Mrs. Knox's home on Wednesday, Jan. 29th, at 2 p.m.

On Friday morning at 10.30 Inspector Pentland addressed a meeting in the school relative to "Consolidated Schools". He began his address by giving his personal idea re the recasting of the township of Artemesia from its 13 school sections to 17 in number, thus overcoming the long walks for many of the children and giving all in the township a better chance to receive an education, and especially a high school education. He gave figures to show that with the grants received the cost of education for the seventeen sections would be less than the cost of the present thirteen. Personally he preferred continuation schools in preference to consolidated schools, as the latter would mean the scrapping of every public school in the township and suggested Proton, Eugenia, Markdale, Pricerville and Durham as the centres for the continuation schools, with two high school and three public school teachers to look after the education of the children, would allow any child to receive his Honour Matriculation ready for University. This would be particularly advantageous to the children miles from our present high schools who wished to further their education. For the whole of Ontario the cost per pupil in the cities was \$83.30, rural \$60.10, consolidated \$69.23, or an average of \$68.82 per pupil for all education. The Government would not press any changes but would co-operate whole heartedly with any changes in this respect that the township wanted. At the close of his address an opportunity was given to ask questions.
