Live Stock Market

With an unexpected supply of over 4000 cattle for Monday's market, which included over 1000 from Western Canada, the market opened very slow and only about half the cattle were sold at the close of the day. Many classes of cattle received no bids. Lamb prices advanced 25 cents per cwt. and hogs gained from 15 to 25 cents per cwt.

A few lots of choice heavy steers sold at from 6 to 6 1/2 c.; fair to good from 5 1/4 to 6c. Choice butchers' ranged from 5 1/4 to 5 3/4 c.; fair to good from 4 1/2 to 5c.; common and medium 3 3/4 to 4 1/4 c.; Baby beefs were fully a half lower, choice selling from 7 to 7 1/2 c.; others lower according to quality. The cow trade was lower, choice from 3 1/2 to 4c.; fair to good from 2 3/4 to 3 1/2 c.; common and medium 2 1/4 to 2 3/4 c.; canners and cutters 1 3/4 to 2 1/4 c. The bull trade was easier, choice at 2 3/4 to 4c.; bolognas 2 1/4 to 3 1/2 c.

Choice lambs were in strong demand at 9c. Alberta's were again prominently displayed on the market. Sheep held steady, choice from 4 to 5c.; heavies 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 c. The calf market held steady, choice veal from 10 to 10 1/2 c.; fair to good at 9 to 10c.; common and medium at 7 to 8c.

The hog market held active and strong, sales being made on Monday on the basis of \$3.50 to \$3.60 for truck delivery. Prospects for the balance of the week will depend a great deal upon supplies.
