Communications were read. Parker - Pottage—That the Treasurer receive from the Dominion Government cheque for the sum of \$6.00, rent for hall in the last Federal election.—Carried.

Parker - Pottage—That the Treasurer receive from C. Fothergill the sum of \$13.20, payment for collecting telephone rates, also long-distance messages.—Carried.

Parker - Pottage—That the Treasurer receive from John Boales the

sum of 60 cents, over-payment on cheque No. 855.—Carried.

Parker - Pottage—That the Reeve and Treasurer be authorized to sign cheques for this Council.—Carried.

Parker - Pottage—That the Clerk make note in refund of dog tax at December meeting stating reasons for refund: that said dogs were on tax notice and not on the assessment notice.—Carried.

Miller - Carruthers—That the Clerk write Mr. Cummings for information re penalties on arrears of taxes and keeping records of same.—Carried.

Miller - Carruthers—That the following taxes be discharged from the defaulters' list as they have been paid to Collector, namely: north half lot 11, con. 12, \$17.85; east half lot 6, con. 2, south half lot 5, con. 4 and part lot 7, con. 5, \$69.80; south half lot 14, con. 6 and south-east quarter lot 13, con. 7, \$23.42; north quarter lot 7, con. 8 and lot 8, con. 8, \$61.15.—Carried.

Miller - Carruthers—That D. L. Binns and S. S. Burrett be appointed Truant Officers for 1936.—Carried.

Parker - Miller—That the Clerk write Mr. Solomon of Meaford cancelling insurance policy on township hall.—Carried.

Carruthers - Miller—That Lorne Curry and Wm. Wright be appointed auditors at a salary of \$20.00 each

for their services.—Carried.

Miller - Carruthers—That Henry Thompson be appointed caretaker of hall at a salary of \$35.00, he to furnish wood and light and supply all repairs for lamps.—Carried.

Miller - Carruthers—That the Clerk advertise for assessor, applications to be received up to 12 o'clock on Feb. 3rd, 1936.—Carried.

By-Law No. 1, authorizing the borrowing of the necessary money until such time as the taxes can be collected, was passed and filed.
