The regular meeting of Markdale Council was held on Monday evening with the Reeve, A. Rusk, presiding. Councillors W. E. White, Walter E. Harris and J. R. Dillon present.

Waterworks accounts were passed as follows: D. Torry, salary, \$30.00; Bell Telephone Co., account, \$3.55; H. J. Armstrong, work on pump, \$4.00; Hydro System, lights, \$2.00; Excise stamps, \$2.00.

Hydro System accounts were ordered paid as follows: H.E.P.C., for power, etc., \$587.58; Jas. Ritchie, meter, \$14.00.

General accounts passed were: J. Lucas, registering births, marriages and deaths, \$16.25, stamps, \$5.00; The Municipal World, supplies, etc., \$2.50; J. W. Elliott, account, \$4.50; J. Quillinan, wood, \$2.50; The Bell Telephone Co., account, \$2.75; A. McClung, work on streets, \$14.00; G. N. Hartley, work at Christmas lights, \$2.00; Geo. Hing, meals for transients, \$2.75; Agricultural Society, re improvements at armouries, \$25.00.

It was decided to take an Employees' Liability Insurance and Mr. A. C. Stewart was instructed to take out policy under plan No. 2 covering all employees.

**GLENELG COUNCIL**

The Council-elect for 1936 met in the Township Hall according to statute on Monday, January 13th. Each member subscribed to the Declaration of Office and took his seat at the Council table as follows:—Reeve, Angus A. McArthur; Councillors, John Newell, E. J. Sullivan, Frank A. D'Arcy, R. C. Robinson. The Reeve briefly addressed the Council.

The minutes of the December meeting were read and confirmed.

By-Laws were passed providing for appointments, etc., as follows: No. 804, appointing Wm. Banks as caretaker of the Township Hall at a salary of \$20.00; No. 805, appointing Patrick McMillan and W. A. Robinson as Auditors at \$15.00 each; No. 806, Board of Health, Dr. Brown, M.O.H., A. A. McArthur, ex-officio, Henry Beaton and H. H. MacDonald, Secretary; No. 807, Robt. G. Peart as Assessor at a salary of \$90.00; No. 808, Geo. G. Collinson and John Fogarty School Attendance Officers for 1936 at a salary of 30 cents per hour for time engaged at their duties; No. 809, Frank Meagher as Weed Inspector at a salary of 30 cents per hour for time employed at duties; No. 810, to provide for total estimated expenditures on Township roads during 1936 as follows: Road

construction \$1000, bridge construction \$12000, machinery \$500, superintendence \$500, maintenance and repair \$6500.

The following accounts were passed and payment ordered: Grey and Bruce Fire Insurance Co., second instalment of insurance on Township buildings, \$7.10; Treasurer, telephoning \$1.11, postage and exchange from July 31, 1935, to Jan. 13, 1936, \$7.52; C. H. Moffat, cabinet for the hall, \$1.75; McFadden Drug Store, journal paper, \$1.50; Planet Printing House, cash receipt book and tax on same, \$7.95; C.P.R., express on cash book, 40 cents; Clerk, registering 15 births, 4 marriages, 20 deaths in 1935, \$9.75; Neil McFarlane and R. J. Ellison, salary as School Attendance Officers for 1935, \$10.00 each; Treasurer of Durham, share of Division Court fees for 1935, \$9.60; Durham Review, advertising from Nov. 15, 1934, to Nov. 21, 1935, \$16.50; Reeve, trip to Dundalk re County equalization of the assessment and one trip to Markdale and car hire for both trips, \$5.00; Clerk, re above, \$2.00, completing two applications for old age pension, \$4.00.

D'Arcy - Robinson—That eight copies of The Municipal World be ordered for members of Council, the Treasurer, Clerk and Road Superintendent.—Carried.

Robinson - Sullivan—That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign petition for the statutory grant on road expenditures showing that there has been spent on roads and bridges the sum of \$5314.02 in 1935.—Carried.

Sullivan - Newell—That the Road Superintendent's Voucher No. 1 be accepted and payments made accordingly, total amount \$793.96.—Cd.

Sullivan - Newell—That the Relief Committee for 1936 be Reeve McArthur, R. C. Robinson and H. H. MacDonald.—Carried.

Relief accounts amounting to \$9.25 were paid.

Newell - Sullivan—That Treasurer be authorized to accept the sum of \$1.50, refund from McFadden's Drug Store for tax arrears book returned.—Carried.

Robinson - D'Arcy—That we endorse the resolution passed by the Grey County Branch of the Ontario Educational Association re system of report cards to be used by M.O.H. re medical examination of school children.—Carried.

Newell - Sullivan—That Council meetings for 1936 be held on the following dates: Feb. 8, March 7, April 4, May 2, June 6, July 4, Aug. 1, Sept. 5, Nov. 14, Dec. 12.—Cd.

Council adjourned to Saturday, Feb. 8th, to receive Auditors' report and for general business.
