Live Stock Market

Over three thousand cattle arrived for Monday's market and there was a fair demand for all classes of cattle, but prices were not high enough in most cases to bring satisfaction to their owners, especially was this shown in the butcher section. The best load of cattle on the market brought 6.75 and averaged almost 1500 lbs. each. They were of very prime quality. The bulk of the choice heavy steers sold at from 5.75 to 6.25; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.50. Choice baby beefs were in good demand at from 6.50 to 7.50. The bulk of the choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 5.00 to 5.25, with a few tops at 5.50. Fair to good at from 4.25 to 4.75; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. The cow-trade was active and strong, choice selling from 3.65 to 4.00; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. Choice bulls were in good demand at from 4.00 to 4.50; bolognas 3.75.

The lamb trade held active and steady under a light supply, the bulk of the choice lambs selling at 9.00; others at slightly lower prices according to quality. Best light sheep brought from 5.00 to 5.50. The calf market was slightly easier, choice veal selling from 10.00 to 11.00; fair to good from 9.00 to 10.00; common and medium 8.00 to 9.00.

The hog market held steady on Monday on the basis of 8.25 f.o.b. and 8.50 for truck deliveries. On Tuesday the market was active and from 10 to 15 cents higher. Prospects are that hog prices will not be any higher just now.

Grey County Council's Warden for 1936 is John E. Dolphin of the Township of Derby. He was elected unanimously on Tuesday evening of last week from a nomination ballot of four names, the other three withdrawing from the contest, a real tribute to the man who was elected to the chair.

Mr. Dolphin is recognized not only in his own Township, but throughout the County, as one of the outstanding men of Grey. A first class businessman farmer, he is a native of Derby township and conducts his farm on lot 1, concession 12.

He has been a member of Derby Township Council for the past eight years, the latter four as Reeve. During his term as representative to the County Council, he has served on almost every standing committee and last year was given the most responsible duty as head of the finance committee.

It is not only in municipal matters that Mr. Dolphin has taken a prominent part, but also in Church and fraternal circles. As a member of the local United Church, he has served as a trustee, as a member of the official board and as chairman of the board of stewards. For over 31 years he has been a member of Sauble Lodge No. 227, I.O.O.F., being a Past Grand of the Tara lodge and a Past District Deputy Grand Master of the district. He is also a member of Bruce Rebekah Lodge No. 237, and for years served as degree captain of this lodge.

Mrs. Dolphin, formerly Miss Ella Nicholson of Arran township, shares her husband's popularity, and is a very fine helpmate. They have one daughter, Rena, now Mrs. Cline McCaslin of Derby township.
