## Mrs. Colin Sutherland Buried in Owen Sound

Funeral services for the late Mrs. Colin Sutherland were held from her late home in Owen Sound on Saturday afternoon, Feb. 8th. The service was in charge of Rev. M. F. Oldham of Tara, a nephew of Mrs. Sutherland, assisted by Rev. Wm. Howey of Owen Sound.

Mrs. Sutherland was a well-known resident of Walters Falls district and her death occurred on Thursday, Feb. 6th, at the age of 80 years. She had been in poor health for some months and death was not unexpected. Her maiden name was Maria Edwards, third daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Edwards. Born in Kinsley Parish, near Alton, England, she came to Canada in 1874, and settled with her parents at Walters Falls. In March, 1904, she was married to the late Colin Sutherland and they resided in Derby for 20 years and then moved to Owen Sound where they had resided for the past 12 years. Mr. Sutherland died about 11 months ago.

She was a life-long member of the Anglican Church. The pallbearers at the funeral were Messrs. P. Rowe, Hugh Menary, W. J. Sutherland, Thomas Ramage, Geo. Sutherland and John Ramage. Burial was made in Greenwood Cemetery, Owen Sound.

## Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were moderate for the opening market of this week and with a fair demand prices held steady, although sales of butcher cattle were a little disappointing. The movement in choice to prime heavy steers was improved, one load averaging almost 1500 lbs. made 7.25, with the bulk of the sales of good to choice weighty steers from 5.75 to 6.50; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.50. Choice butcher cattle sold mostly at from 5.00 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.00; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. Fed calves were in good demand, choice from 6.50 to 7.50; other lower according to quality. The cow trade was active and strong, choice from 4.00 to 4.25; fair to good from 3.25 to 3.90; common and medium 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.65. Choice heavy bulls sold steady at from 4.00 to 4.50; bolognas 3.50 to 3.75.

With a light supply of lambs the market recovered some of the decline shown last week, choice lambs selling from 8.50 to 8.75, with a few extra choice at 9.00. The sheep trade held active and steady, choice light sheep from 5.00 to 5.50; others lower according to quality. The calf trade was active and strong, choice calves selling from 10.00 to 11.00; fair to good from 8.50 to 9.50; common and medium 7.00 to 8.00.

Following last week's sharp advance in hog prices, which showed a gain of \$1.00 per cwt. at the close the market weakened under a steady supply, packers bids being from 75 to 85 cents lower. Monday's sales were made on the basis of 8.50 for truck deliveries, most of the hogs going to the smaller buyers. Tuesday's closing sales were made on the basis of 8.35 for truck deliveries.

## A Correct View of the Flesherton Expulsion

The Flesherton Advance this week has the following to say regarding the trouble in connection with the affairs of the Centre Grey Hockey League:

A despatch from Markdale in Monday's edition of the Owen Sound Sun-Times is very misleading and is not a true picture of the events leading up to the withdrawal from the Centre Grey Hockey League of the Flesherton team. Following is the article in part:

"The unfortunate occurrence had its birth in a protest lodged by the Chatsworth and Markdale hockey clubs over the use of Cyril Proctor, Flesherton pivot-man. The protest was based on one of the League's primary rules, namely 'that no player, if a member of any hockey club associated with the O.H.A., is eligible to play in Centre Grey ranks.'"

"While inquiring into the matter the executive discovered that Proctor was a member of Owen Sound Olympics an O.H.A. team. When the Flesherton Club received word that they could no longer use Proctor, and must replay all games in which he participated, they felt that they suffered an injustice and hence placed their withdrawal in the president's hands."

The start of the trouble occurred in a game played in Flesherton with Chatsworth as the visiting team after Cyril Proctor had played an O.H.A. game with Owen Sound. Following this Chatsworth entered a formal legal protest and a mutual agreement was arrived at to replay the disputed game with the proceeds to be divided between the two teams, but the executive met to deal with the protest, at which meeting Markdale entered a verbal protest against Proctor, who had played both games against Markdale, which Flesherton won, having as evidence a telegram from W. A. Hewitt, secretary of the O.H.A., stating that Proctor's certificate was signed on December 23, 1935. This meeting of the executive was held seven days following the disputed Flesherton and Chatsworth game. When it is known that all protests should have been made in writing within 48 hours, it can be seen that the Markdale protest was not in order.

Flesherton played Proctor in good faith as he was residing here at the time and declared that he had not signed an O.H.A. certificate, statements which he backed by an affidavit. The club also had a statement from the Olympic Club of Owen Sound to the effect that he had not signed the certificate. This evidence was not given any consideration by the Centre Grey Hockey League executive who refused a hearing for the Flesherton Club to state its facts. Proctor was not used by Flesherton in further games.

Following the drawing up of the second half of the league schedule, Markdale played a schedule game in Flesherton on Feb. 3, which the latter won 10-5 with the return game to be played in Markdale on February 7, the secretary of the League informed the Flesherton club that these games were to be played as the protested games with Markdale. When Flesherton refused to play the games under such conditions they were notified by the secretary that the Flesherton club was expelled from the league.

In fairness to everybody and for the good of amateur sport why does the league not enforce one rule as well as another? In the first place Dundalk and Markdale teams were not legally entered, the latter not having done so until after the first Markdale-Flesherton game had been played. In the matter of the Markdale protest it was illegal in two ways, first not being entered in time, and second not in the proper manner. It would only be fair to the Flesherton Club for the League executive to reopen the case and deal with it, giving consideration to the facts that have been gathered by the Flesherton Club, which has not been given a proper chance to state its

case. As Flesherton won the first half of the schedule, is it that the other clubs do not wish to have the local team in any further contests? It would appear so.

The Standard knows nothing of the matter other than that our neighbors were able to defeat our boys on the ice and we were quite satisfied to allow that state of affairs to exist until such time as we had developed a team which could trim them. We heard no complaints from the supporters of the team regarding the playing of Proctor and as a matter of fact there are several of the home boys on the Flesherton team more effective on the ice than this Owen Sound player. It's up to the executive of the League to see that the regulations are observed but we see no reason for hard feelings between the players of the several teams. The Standard has always tried to foster harmony and good-fellowship between our neighbors and ourselves. The smart junior aggregation which will represent Markdale in the W.O.H.A. is to be assisted by Flesherton boys and Markdale people appreciate this spirit of fellowship and co-operation.
