## The Late Wm. H. Fenwick

The late Wm. H. Fenwick was born in Artemesia township, near Flesherton, 67 years ago on May 13, 1936. He was the second son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fenwick. The family were John and Maria twins, Will and Sarah twins, Joseph and Thomas.

When quite a young man he went to Toronto where he had spent the past 50 years of his life, being prominent in the business life of the east end of the city. He commenced as a labourer with the Canadian Ammonia Co., which was absorbed by the Canadian Industrial Limited. He was promoted to foreman and then began work for himself in the storage and cartage business of which he was president and in which he was active for the past 44 years. He was Alderman for Ward One, Toronto, in 1917. He was a past president of the Cartage and Warehousemen's Association and a life member of Flesherton Old Boys' and Girls' Association. He was a member of Occident Masonic Lodge, St. Patrick's Chapter, R.A.M.; he also belonged to Riverdale Odd Fellows Lodge and Cumberland L.O.L. and Danforth Businessmen's Association. He attended St. John's Presbyterian Church.

"Bill" Fenwick, as he was commonly known, was the one who was instrumental in raising funds to purchase a new food wagon which was sent overseas to Col. G. R. Geary's Sportsmen's Battalion. He was also the leading spirit in staging a monster picnic that raised funds for the War Widows' and Orphans' Association.

The deceased had been ill five weeks with bronchial trouble. A doctor and two nurses were in attendance. All that could be done was done by loving hands of those

so near and dear to him but proved of no avail. He was taken to the East General Hospital a few days prior to his passing which occurred on Monday, Jan. 20th.

The funeral was held on Thursday, Jan. 23rd, at 3 o'clock p.m. A private service was held at his late residence, 501 Logan Ave., after which a public service was held in the chapel of St. John's Presbyterian Church with Rev. Dr. R. G. Stewart officiating. Another service was held at St. John's cemetery under the auspices of Riverdale Lodge, I. O. O. F., and Cumberland L.O.L. No. 621. The pallbearers were James Armstrong, Richard Lyons, David Sanderson, Harry Winfield, Burton Fields and Thomas Paterson.

Honorary pallbearers were representatives of the many organizations to which Mr. Fenwick belonged and were: Thos. Murphy M.P., Garrett Tyrell, Major J. T. Dempster, Adam Robertson, Wm. Pickard, J. W. Keeler, Garnet Shier, Inspector W. C. Johnston, Lieut.-Col. W. H. Hedges, Wm. N. Hemphill, D. S. Swan, Mr. M. Chambers, Joe Harris and Thos. Church M.P.

Flowers were in profusion witnessing love for the deceased and sympathy for the bereaved.

The chief mourners were: His wife, Mrs. Margaret Fenwick; his daughters, Mrs. A. M. Sloan, Mrs. E. V. Browning and Miss Sadie Fenwick; his son, Stanley; his twin sister, Mrs. J. Williams of Eugenia; his brothers, Thomas of Eugenia and John of Toronto. These are all left in sad bereavement as well as a sister, Mrs. Ed. Legard, of Glenside, Sask., and to them we extend our sincere sympathy. A brother, Joseph, predeceased him a few years ago.

Rev. Dr. Stewart at the Church service spoke highly of the deceased. He said "the late Mr. Fenwick did not carry his religion on his coat sleeve. As a matter of fact he did

not often go to Church. But speaking personally, I would rather take his chance of heaven than the chances of many who make a great fuss of their convictions. Mr. Fenwick felt deeply about his faith, but only those close to him were permitted to know that. His religion took the form of practical help for those in need. I never appealed to him in vain. He always responded generously to any worthy cause. He was an exceedingly kind father and a generous neighbor. It can well be said of him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant!'
