EUGENIA

The Late Thomas Genoe

Another of our esteemed pioneer residents has answered the last call in the person of Mr. Thomas Genoe, who passed away about 10 o'clock Thursday morning, Jan. 30th. The late Mr. Genoe, who was in his 81st year, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Genoe. He had been critically ill a couple of months ago but overcame this and seemed to be regaining his health. A few days before his death he did not seem quite so well again, but no one thought the end was so near, but he passed peacefully and suddenly away. His wife, whose maiden name was Miss Maggie Hislop, predeceased him about two years ago. They resided nearly all their lifetime in Artemesia with the exception of a year or so, when they lived in the United States. Together with patience they met the trials and troubles of pioneer life, residing for a number of years on the 10th line farm, later moving to the village. They raised a family of five children, namely: Adam of Meaford; Thomas of Ceylon; David of Eugenia, and Ray at the home in the village. A daughter, Belle (Mrs. Fred. Wickens) predeceased him over 20 years ago. In religion Mr. Genoe was a member of Cedarville Mission, Toronto, but often attended the Baptist Churches at Rock Mills and Flesherton.

On Saturday afternoon the funeral was held from his late residence to Flesherton cemetery. Rev. Mr. Wolsteneroff, Baptist Minister, of Flesherton officiated. He spoke words showing high respect for the deceased and was assured that he had gained life eternal. The hymns that were sung were "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus". The pallbearers were Fred. Wickens, John Hislop, Jack Campbell, Wilfred Magee, Louis Teeter and Louis Genoe.

After the death of his wife his son Ray, wife and children lived with him making life more pleasant for him during his last days. Besides his family he leaves in sad bereavement one sister, Mary Ann (Mrs. Dave Wright) of Winnipeg, Man., who is over 90 years of age. To the bereaved friends and relatives we extend our sincere sympathy and may God comfort them in their sad hours.

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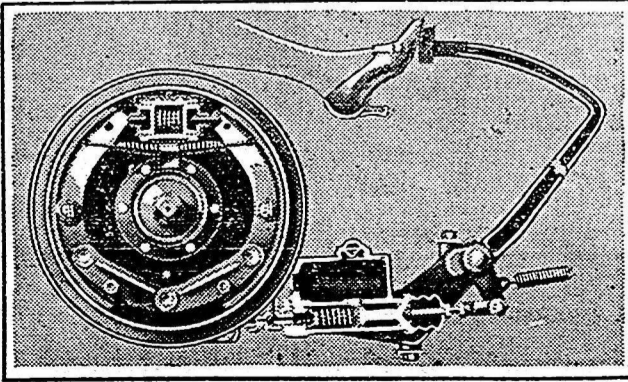
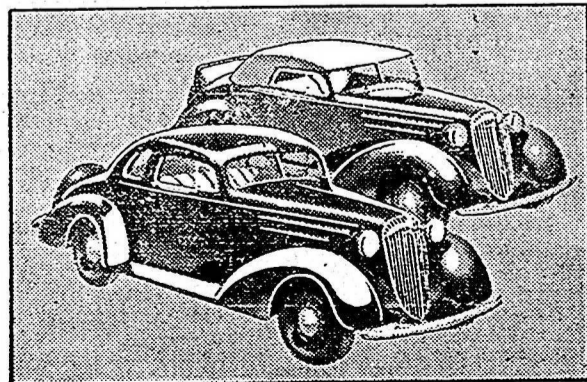
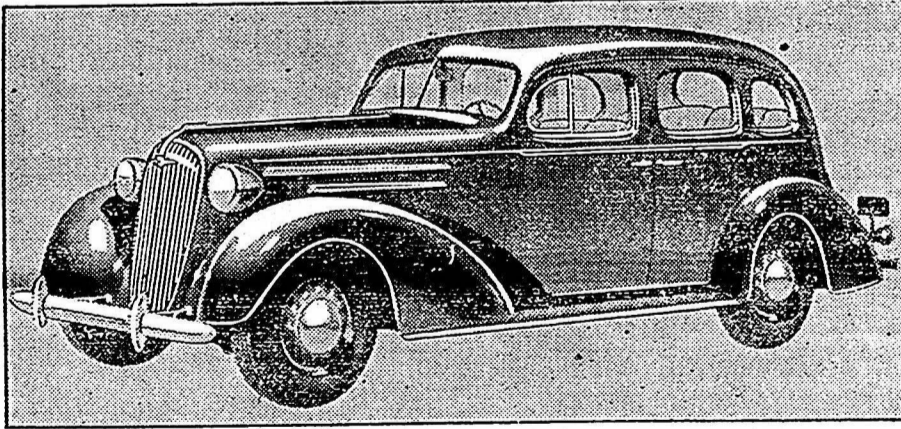
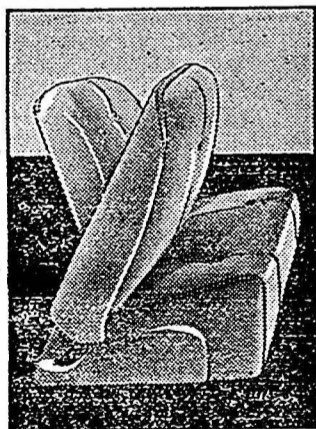
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1936 Master and Standard Chevrolets Replete with New Features
