Live Stock Market

Considerable assistance was given to the cattle market on Monday by export buyers for Great Britain, some 400 cattle being bought and shipped this week. In spite of this fact, prices were not good and all classes of cattle are selling on a lower level. All markets, in both Canada and the United States are similarly affected. The bulk of the good to choice heavy steers sold at from 5.25 to 5.75, with a few tops at 6.00. Fair to good sold at 4.75 to 5.25. Choice light butcher steers ranged from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.00 to 4.50; common and medium 3.25 to 3.50. Choice baby heaves were in fair demand from 6.50 to 7.50; others downwards to 5.00. Stockers and feeders were slow of sale from 3.75 to 4.25. The cow market was active and steady with choice from 3.75 to 4.25; fair to good from 3.25 to 3.75; common

and medium from 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters from 2.00 to 2.50. Best milkers and springers ranged from 50 to 65 each. The bull trade held active and steady, with choice heavy bulls 4.25 to 4.75; others from 4.00 to 4.25.

In the small meats the lamb market was active and steady, choice feed-lot lambs selling at 8.75; other grades ranged from 7.00 to 8.50. Choice light sheep made from 5.25 to 5.50. Calves opened up very slow and prices were fully 50 cents lower. Choice kind sold mostly at from 10.00 to 10.50; fair to good from 8.50 to 9.50; common and medium 6.00 to 7.50.

Supplies of hogs were heavy and prices eased off. Monday's sales being made on the basis of 8.50 f.o.b. and 8.60 off trucks. On Tuesday the market was steady to a shade easier.

The Cookstown Agricultural Society wound up the year's business with a balance of \$358.04 after paying 100 per cent. prize money.
