Mail Courier Has Bad Accident on Highway

Mr. T. H. Wilson, courier for R. R. 7, had a serious accident on Friday afternoon on the highway causing him considerable loss and inconvenience. A truck overtook Mr. Wilson, who was driving a horse and cutter, on the north side of Mount Pleasant and as the road was rather narrow the horse took fright and shied as it passed by, causing the cutter to upset. Luckily Mr. Wilson rolled out just behind the rear wheel of the truck and received no injury. The horse, after dragging him for a short distance by the lines, was let free and ran on to Berkeley, where it was caught at Rowe's Garage. Both harness and cutter were broken beyond repair, and the horse suffered several bad cuts on one of its legs. From Berkeley Mr. Wilson phoned to Markdale for Wallace Wilson, in whose truck the horse and driver returned to the village, leaving the mail at Berkeley post office until the next day.

Archie Neilson Passed Away in Toronto

Robert Archibald Neilson, manager of the Neilson Lumber Co., died at his residence, 326 Beresford Ave., Toronto, on Wednesday, Mar. 4th, after a brief illness. He was stricken the Saturday preceding his death.

The late Mr. Neilson was widely known in the lumbering trade in Ontario, having come from a family of lumberman and was associated with his brother, Roy, in the business in Toronto. He was born at Proton Station and worked for a time in his father's mill there, later going to North Battleford, Sask., and establishing himself in business. He went to Toronto and founded the business that bears his name. He was a Presbyterian, a Mason and an Odd Fellow. One son, Robert; two daughters, Misses Noreen and Ruth; his mother, Mrs. Janet Neilson; three brothers, Milton A. of Buffalo, James Roy of Mimico and John Bruce of Huntsville; and two sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) John Wray of Lethbridge, Alta., and Miss Ethel C. Neilson in Toronto, survive.

The funeral took place on Friday, March 6th. Interment was made in Park Lawn Cemetery.

Mrs. J. J. Matheson of Massie is Dead

The death occurred in the hospital at Owen Sound on Tuesday, March 3rd, of Mrs. J. J. Matheson of Massie. The deceased had been in ill health since Christmas and a week before her death was taken to the hospital where, on Monday, she underwent an operation for goitre.

Mrs. Matheson was born 42 years ago on Dec. 15th in Euphrasia township, a daughter of Mr. R. W. Quinton of Walters Falls, and the late Mrs. Quinton, who died two years ago. Her maiden name was Beatrice. Sixteen years ago she was united in marriage to Mr. J. J. Matheson, who survives with one son, Keith, aged four. There are also three sisters and two brothers, Miss Olive Quinton of Owen Sound, Miss Hilda Quinton of Woodstock, Mrs. E. L. Vivian of Brantford, Maurice at home and Emerson at Walters Falls.

She was a member of the Anglican Church and both before and after her marriage was active in its work as well as being a prominent member of the Massie Women's Institute.

Former Resident Died at Angus

After a severe illness of seven weeks Mr. Edward Rutherford of Proton Station passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Andrew Miscampbell of Angus, where he had gone when he became ill.

The funeral service at Angus was conducted by Mr. Waterson, assisted by Rev. A. P. Stanley, United Church minister at Angus. The body was then brought to Flesherton, where interment was made. Mr. Waterson of Angus had charge of the services in Flesherton. The pallbearers at Flesherton were Messrs. A. Sherson, N. McCannell, John Dever, W. Dever, E. Duncan and W. Nicholls. Mr. Rutherford is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Jas. F. Acheson of Dundalk district and Mrs. Andrew Miscampbell of Angus.

The late Edward Rutherford was born 81 years ago in Artemesia township, and moved with his parents when a young child to Proton, near Dundalk, where he lived with his widowed mother until young manhood. He was married in 1887 to Elizabeth Ludlow and moved to Tiago and later to Angus, where he purchased a farm. Three children were born to this union—a son and two daughters. The son died when quite young.

Mr. Rutherford, with his wife and daughters, later came to Markdale and for some years he was manager of Dr. Sproule's farm, afterwards returning to his own farm at Angus. In 1908 he moved to Proton Station where he made his home until his death. In 1909 his wife died and in 1911 he was married to Mrs. J. White of Erin, who died ten years ago.

Mr. Rutherford was a kind, considerate friend and a good neighbor.

Daniel Ormsby Died in Euphrasia Township

Mr. Daniel Ormsby died in Euphrasia township on March 5th in his 75th year. Deceased had been in ill health for some time. He was a well known farmer and had farmed in St. Vincent and Euphrasia townships for many years. The late Mr. Ormsby was twice married, his first wife being Rose Merrifield, who predeceased him about thirty-two years ago. There were three sons and one daughter born to this union, W. Earl and Mary (Mrs. F. Kerr) of St. Vincent; Elmer of Euphrasia, and Cecil in Saskatchewan. His second wife, who survives, was formerly Mrs. Matilda Rathwell and to them were born five sons and two daughters, Clarence and Otto of St. Vincent; Mrs. Robt. Burns (Lillian) of Inglis Falls; Miss Elsie of Toronto; Gordon, Russell and Stewart at home. One stepson, Wm. Rathwell of Walters Falls, and two brothers and one sister, Mrs. M. Foy of Euphrasia; Andrew of Rocklyn; Thos. of Woodstock, also survive. A brother, John, and a sister, Mrs. G. Curry, predeceased him about six years ago.

The service which was held at the home of his son, Earl, on Saturday, March 7th, was conducted by Rev. W. Perry of Walters Falls and was largely attended. The pallbearers were neighbors of the deceased, namely: Messrs. Richard Ford, Geo. Boyes, Charles Doherty, Wm. Abercrombie, Jas. Rumsby and Bernard Arthur. The remains were conveyed to Lakeview Chapel, Meaford.

Mrs. Jacob Allan Passed Away at Meaford

Deceased had suffered from heart ailment which had confined her to her home for the past few years. She was born in Euphrasia township. Besides her sorrowing husband she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. George Newell (Anne), and five sons, Frederick, Edward, Herman, Thomas and Glen. Mrs. Allan resided in the Meaford vicinity all her life and her loving kindness will be sadly missed by all who know her. Besides her two daughters and aged mother, she leaves two brothers, John W. McKee of Artemesia and Joseph McKee of Melville, Sask. A sister, Teressa (Mrs. S. Robinson) predeceased her by 25 years. Mrs. McCallum moved to Flesherton with her mother 18 years ago last November. She was a member of St. John's United Church, formerly Presbyterian, and had been an earnest worker in all Church activities, choir, Sunday School and other organizations.
