On Sunday morning about three clock the alarm of fire was sounded, when the greater portion of our residents awoke from peaceful slumpers to see the cruel flames leap and play majestically over and about Grant & Co.'s planing mill. The fire must have originated in the second flat and spread with great rapidity. The upper flat was used as a work shop in one end and furniture show room at the other, and Mrs. Robt. S. Erskine, aged 11 there was no possibility of saving anything upstairs. Even the tools of Mr. Grant, as also those of Silas Hill, were burned. A portion of the machinery on the first flat was saved.
