Mr. Harold Falconer is busy these days taking orders for wallpapers. He has some excellent samples of Sunworthy paper.

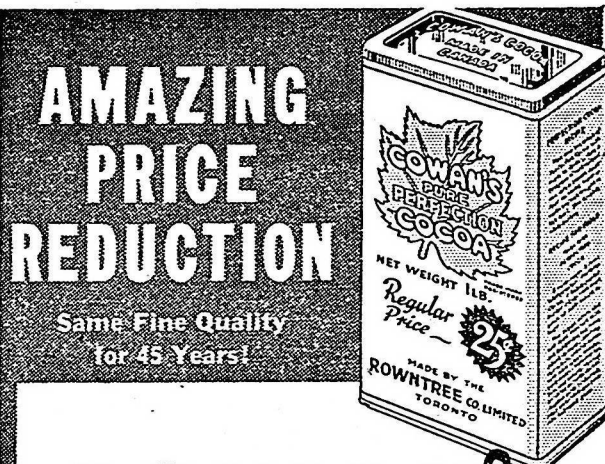
