FREE NITRO CULTURE

The Department of Bacteriology, Ottawa, are again sending out sufficient culture to treat one bushel of clovers, beans, peas and alfalfa free of charge. Farmers wishing the same should apply to the Grey County Branch, Department of Agriculture, Markdale, immediately.

Remember each clover requires a different culture. Therefore when applying, please state whether it is alfalfa, red clover, alsike clover, sweet clover, peas or beans that the culture is required for. Each farmer can secure only one culture. Understand also that it requires about 10 days for the order to be filled. Do not wait, therefore, till you are ready to sow.

There will also be additional bottles held at the office for those wanting to sow more than one bushel. These have been secured from the Department of Bacteriology, O.A.C., Guelph. These will be sold at a small price by The Department of Agriculture, Markdale.
