## Live Stock Market

The cattle market was more encouraging to all concerned when Monday's market opened up with a good demand for all classes. Export buyers were active in securing their requirements, which was a stimulant to the market as a whole. Choice butcher cattle advanced from 15 to 25 cents and choice heavy steers were a shade higher, a few top sales being made at from 6.25 to 6.75. The bulk of the good weighty steers brought from 5.25 to 6.00, with those of medium quality from 4.75 to 5.00. Some choice light butcher steers brought 5.50; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.25; common and medium from 4.00 to 4.50. The cow trade was active and strong for those of choice quality at from 3.50 to 4.00; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common and medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 1.75 to 2.50. Choice baby heaves brought from 6.00 to 6.75, while those of medium quality ranged from 5.00 to 6.00. A few loads of light stockers brought from 3.50 to 4.25. The bull trade was higher, choice light butcher bulls from 3.75 to 4.00; choice heavies from 3.60 to 3.85; bolognas easier at 2.75 to 3.00.

Supplies of lambs were very light and prices advanced sharply to \$10. On Monday and again on Tuesday one deck of Alberta lambs brought 10.50. The sheep trade was stronger with choice light sheep at 6.00. The calf market was inclined to be slow but prices held steady, choice calves selling from 9.00 to 9.50, with a few fancy calves at 10.00; fair to good at from 8.00 to 9.00; common and medium 5.00 to 7.00.

Supplies of hogs were heavy and this, together with lower reports from Great Britain, had a tendency to lower prices in spite of all that could be done by salesmen to avoid any cut. Monday's sales were made at from 8.35 to 8.60 for truck deliveries and on Tuesday the market closed weak at from 15 to 20 cents lower.
