### Live Stock Market

Supplies of cattle were heavy for the opening market of the week and this together with lower reports on American markets had a tendency to lower prices. Export buyers for shipments to the United Kingdom were inactive.

A few lots of choice heavy steers sold at from 6.00 to 6.25; good to choice at from 5.50 to 6.00; common and medium 4.50 to 5.25. Choice butcher cattle brought from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.25 to 4.75; common and medium 3.50 to 4.00. Baby heaves were slow of sale, excepting for a few choice at from 6.00 to 6.50; others downward to 4.75. There was a fair demand for good feeders at from 4.00 to 4.50 and light stockers from 3.75 to 4.25. The cow market opened with a fair demand, but prices generally were from 15 to 25c. easier. Some of the best cows brought from 3.50 to 3.75; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common and medium 2.50 to 2.75; canners and cutters 1.50 to 2.25. The bull trade was active and strong, choice light butcher bulls from 3.75 to 4.25; heavy bulls from 3.50 to 4.00; common 3.00 to 3.25.

Lambs again featured the market, advancing to 11.00 for choice feed lot shipments, while those of medium quality brought from 10.00 to 10.50. Choice spring lambs, weighing around 60 lbs., showing quality and finish, brought from 7.00 to 9.00 each. The sheep trade held steady, choice light sheep from 5.50 to 6.00; heavy from 3.25 to 4.50; culls 2.00 to 3.00. The calf trade was easier due to heavy supplies and lower quotations from American markets. Good to choice calves brought from 9.00 to 9.50; fair to good from 8.00 to 9.00; common and medium 5.00 to 6.50.

The hog market held active and steady and on Tuesday with a good demand prices generally were higher, closing sales being made at from 3.35 to 3.50 for truck deliveries.
