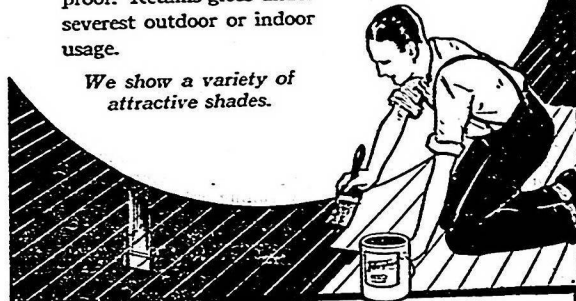

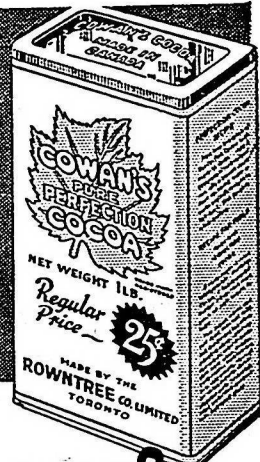

HOLLAND TOWNSHIP COUNCIL MINUTES

Holland, April 7th, 1936

Council met on Tuesday, April 7th, for the transaction of Township business. All the members were present and the Reeve, John Heighes, Esq., presided.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Accounts for relief, totalling \$74.18, were read.

Report of G. J. McNeely, valuing sheep of Duke Abbey and Jos. Woyce, \$3.20, was read.

Sheep accounts: Duke Abbey, sheep killed and injured, \$43.00; Joseph Woyce, one sheep killed, \$10.00.

Howey - Sutcliffe—That this Council pay Auditors \$10.00 each to complete audit in compliance with requirements of the Department.—Carried.

Sutcliffe - Gillespie—That R. Dixon and the Reeve be a committee to appoint Auditors to complete the audit according to the requirements of the Department.—Carried.

Gillespie - Sutcliffe—That the Department of Agriculture have free use of hall for meeting held on Wednesday, April 1st, 1936.—Carried.

Dixon - Howey—That the Road Commissioner and W. Sutcliffe be a committee to advertise for and purchase a grader with six foot blade.—Carried.

Dixon - Howey—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet No. 2 for \$63.70 be passed and the Treasurer be instructed to issue cheques for the same.—Carried.

Mr. Howey presented Report No. 4 of Finance Committee recommending payment of \$130.33.

Gillespie - Dixon—That Report No. 4 of Finance Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, May 5th, at one o'clock p.m.
