Vancouver's Golden Jubilee

Fifty years ago the first trans-Firty years ago the first trans-continental Canadian Pacific Railway train from Montreal reached the Pacific Coast. This summer Vancouver, now the Gateway to the Orient and port for ships of the entire world, will celebrate the Golden Jubilee of its founding as the western of its founding as the western terminal of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Commencing July 1 Dominion and International Good Dominion and international con-cludes with the Canada Pacific Exhibition on September 7, and includes land and water sports, includes land and water spots, several weeks of grand pageantry, musical attractions, visit of American warships, a two-day air show with a solo flight across Canada planned as the highlight floral decorations, visit of 15,000 re-enacting of the arrival of the Shriners in mid-July, traditional first Canadian Pacific train

pageantry of an Aldershot tatioo, frontier week, street dancing and costume balls, and historical exhibits arranged to illustrate Vancouver's steady progress during the first half century of its existence.

Even before the beginning of the celebration proper, many colorful events will be given rec-ognition, including Empire Day and horticulture show in May; Pioneers' festival on June 13-14; schools' programme in May: Pioneers' festival on June; Springs Hotel:
