### Grey Presbytery Met in Maxwell People Injured Mrs. James Foster Died Bank Manager Arrested for Theft of Bonds

Reginald J. Gilfillan, 48, of 215 Clendenning Avenue, manager of the Royal York Hotel branch of the Bank of Montreal, was arrested in his office at noon yesterday by Detective-Sergeant James Mcllrath. charged with theft of securities valued at \$35,458 from the bank.

Gilfillan refused at police headquarters to make any statement concerning the charge. He asked for his lawyer, with whom he talked for considerable time. He was then transferred to Court Street Station.

The prisoner, the police said, was in a highly nervous condition when arrested and on the verge of collapsing.

For a number of years he was emloyed with the bank, having been in a West Toronto branch before being transferred to the downtown

The police said none of the reported missing securities had been found. A week's remand will be asked for by the Crown in the Police Court this morning. This will enable the police to investigate Gilfillan's reported dealings on the stock market.
